HUMAN BONES FOUND IN PICKERING WOOD

Bones of an adult person have been unearthed in a woods at Pickering and sent to provincial police headquarters for examination and possible identification. The remains, which were found in sandy soil, are said to be well preserved, and are thought to be those of a tall man of middle age. The teeth are in excellent condition and none are missing.

No person has been reported to the Pickering police to be missing from the district.

A similar case was recently discovered in Scarborough. Here a young woman's remains were found in sandy soil. The latter proved to be the remains of a young Indian girl, who was thought to have died on the old Kingston trail, which ran through the fields.
