**"MUSTY" BYLAWS**

Some towns come in for a good deal of notoriety for being up-to-date some for being progressive in other lines, but Stouffville has been receiving provincial-wide publicity because our municipal councils keep in operation a section of a bylaw which is antiquated and musty with age. Annually since the town was incorporated the council have appointed along with the other municipal officers two men to act as fence viewers. Fifty years ago that was alright for there were need of fences and high ones too, judging by the reading in back files of The Tribune where cattle pastured on the streets were reputed to be "breecy." At the first council meeting this year the Town Fathers again appointed fence viewers, and our comment of the appointment going to an Ex-reeve has attracted attention outside. The Mail and Empire devoted a more or less lengthy editorial to the article printed below from the Chesley Enterprise. The Mail declared The Tribune was not bound to answer the Chesley editor's demands, and that Stouffville has the prerogative to appoint fence viewers if she sees fit.

We have no explanation to give our Chesley brother, other than what he can understand from "musty" bylaws. Probably the local council will see fit to bring the town bylaws up-to-date, now the matter has had so much publicity. Here is what the Chesley Enterprise editor, says from the pen of Wm. McDonald,

Ex-Liberal M. P. P.  
"It is incumbent on township councils to appoint fence viewers to adjust differences between neighboring farmers, ideas of what constitutes a proper fence to keep cattle, sheep, and hogs from becoming marauders on property that does not belong to their owner. When fence viewers cannot arbitrate satisfactorily as to the height, number of strands of wire or fence rails and their closeness to each other then recourse must be had to the courts and at present a suit is pending at the next sitting of the Division Court in Tara between two farmers of 12th Con. Elderslie who will not accept the fence viewers decision.

At the January meeting rural councils appointed their fence viewers but we never heard of an urban council appointing such an official till we read of an ex-reeve of Stouffville being handed that position. Stouffville is a bright and progressive village in the north-east section of York County, 29 miles from Toronto, and at the inaugural meeting of the council an ex-reeve of the village was appointed fence viewer. What's the idea? Do cows still pasture on the streets of Stouffville? Are some of those enclosed in their own lot breecy? Are hogs breaking through their own enclosures and grunting around the main street of the village worse than the old folk who have rheumatiz? It's hard to keep hens at home but the cows, sheep, and pigs of Stouffville are not so numerous that a fence viewer has to be appointed to keep them within bounds. That office of fence viewer in Stouffville should be as great a snap so far as work and responsibility are concerned as a senatorship. The big difference will be in the emoluments. With a fence viewer Stouffville should have an official dog catcher and sheep valuator. What about a weed inspector too? Has Stouffville still got old stump fences such as are still to be seen in Halton County; the snake fences of pioneer days, the straight stake-and-rider fence or the new wire fences?

Albert Nolan, a former partner in the Enterprise office, is editor and proprietor of the Stouffville paper and we would like to get his explanation of the service that will be required of the village fence viewer so that we can recommend it for a place like Southampton where there are many vacant lots and many cows are kept in summer time for the supply of milk for the tired cottagers."

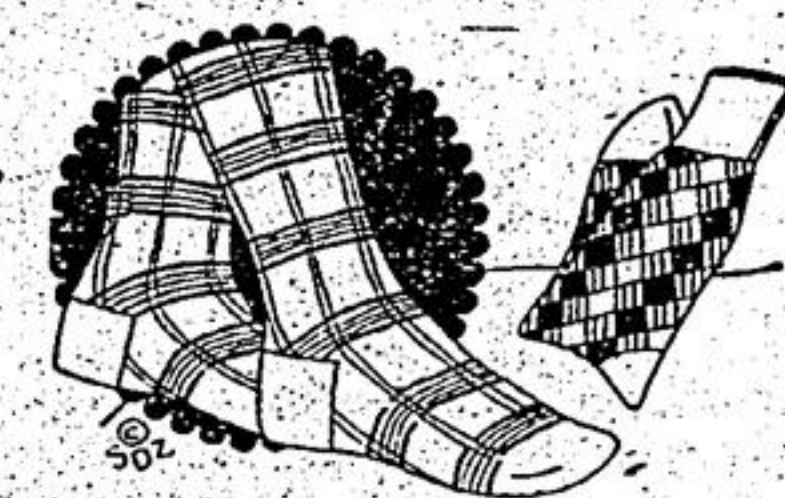
