COUNTY SCHOOL GRANTS

The York County taxes which have been advancing with leaps and bounds, for years now, chiefly to meet the increased expenditure on roads and for school costs, took another step forward in 1929. The rate is not usually struck until the June meeting but this year owing to the increased tax and to allow these municipalities which strict their rate very early in the year, to provide the proper sums, council settled the matter at the meeting of the year. Below we give the estimate for 1929 secondary education (high and continuation schools) and of the amounts set the county pays one half. The remaining half is raised by the municipality and the government grants. It will be noticed that Stouffville school receives a substantial increase due to the new wing being built, but it will be found that the increase grant will little more than reach increased assessment placed on the municipality as a whole due to the advanced tax rate to nine mills.

Look over these figures and note the advanced grants made to the large schools in the south of the county near Toronto:

DEALING WITH THE MOTORIST "DRUNK"

In Australia he may be hanged if he kills a Person—with other Drastric Penalties

Australia, although without a prohibition statute, has avoided the drunken driver problem, by making the penalties so strict that motorists fear to incur them. A motorist may be hanged if he kills a person while under the influence of liquor, or if the driver is convicted only of manslaughter, in such cases he is subjected to eight or ten years imprisonment. Knocking another person unconscious in traffic accidents is punishable by two to four years imprisonment if the driver is intoxicated, while the lowest penalty for drunken driving is a fine of \$125, six months imprisonment and loss of license.
