Scotch City Has Fine Women's Club

Aberdeen, Scotland—The women of Aberdeen seem to have been particularly successful in their achievements in 1928, particularly the Aberdeen Business Women's Club. This club is unique in Great Britain, outside of London, and deserves the admiration it has aroused in other Scottish cities. Its example may well be followed by Aberdeen's neighbors, as the need is great. Miss Betina Clark, the warden of the club, welcomed all inquiries, and Miss B. Walker, who was its founder, was enthusiastic over its possibilities.

It was felt, Miss Clark said, that Aberdeen had many young business women who needed a social center and residential club, but the difficulty was how to get it financed. Help has flowed in from all sorts of quarters, but the chief support came from the Y.W.C.A., which generously supplied the initial sum of £2000 at a small rate of interest. Two beautiful old houses in one of the best squares in the city were purchased, and on these there is a bond of another £2000. Over 700 business women have joined, which gives the club £350 in subscriptions alone. The letting of their beautiful dance hall also is a source of income, and altogether the finances of the club are in a most satisfactory position. The residents have charming rooms, and pay for room and full board only £1 a week for a north room, and 22s. a week for a south room—which seems unbelievably cheap in these days. Everything, however, seems to work out profitably in such a large family—the restaurant is charming, the food appetizing, but all help the venture to pay its way. The girls, Miss Clark said, were keen on having the club free, and are constantly devising new ways and means to clear the debt—a splendid Aberdonian trait, as the visitors remarked.

"What is this?" Miss Clark was asked pointing to what looked like a model of a Norwegian saeter.

"A present from one of our workmen," she replied. "At the time of our sale in the Music Hall we were touched and pleased to receive from every man who had been employed on the reconstruction a contribution made by himself. This beautifully made model, presented by a joiner, was won by a well-wisher who returned it to the club as a gift. This attitude of the workmen was typical of the interest and goodwill our venture aroused."

In 1928 Aberdeen, also, appointed her first policewoman, and during the year the Soroptomists appeared on all city's horizon. Aberdeen has also one of the best industrial women's clubs in the country—the St. Katherine's Club. In addition, the Cowdray Club caters for its professional women in the city and in the country the Women's Rural Institutes have had a wonderful year of prosperity. Altogether at the present moment the women of Aberdeen seem to be leading in the club movement in Scotland, and everything points to real growth and development in the Granite City.
