### WIDE RANGE OF PAY

There is a wide variation in the salaries paid by the different townships, towns and villages for the services of auditors which must be appointed each year. The township of Markham for two years have engaged a firm of chartered accountants to do this work at a cost of \$250 a year, while their northern neighbor The Township of Whitchurch, pays around \$10 each to two local auditors. In the village of Stouffville the books are audited at an annual cost of \$15. The town of Uxbridge pays \$50. Each to the local auditors. There is a considerable difference in the amount of work to be done in one place as against another municipality, but it does not vary in these municipalities named, anything like the variation in the money paid for the auditing. There is a vast difference between auditing books and checking over accounts, which is all the average audit is, but so far as we know the municipalities who pay the smaller amounts accomplish the result which the council are most anxious to know, namely that

none of the funds of the previous year were misappropriated by those who have them in their control.
