Extend Medical Service In North

Department of the Interior Will Establish Two More Stations in Arctic Canada

Realizing that the future development of Northern Canada depends to a large extent on the health and general well-being of the native population every effort is being put forth by the Department of the Interior to protect the Eskimos of the Far North. When the Department assumed charge of Eskimo affairs in 1927 one of the important steps taken was the decision to increase the number of medical officers among the natives. Two officers were stationed in the Arctic during 1928, one at Pangnirtung, Baffin Island, and the other at Alkavik, Mackenzie River delta. This year a third post will be established at Chesterfield Inlet on the western shore of Hudson bay, and a fourth on the Arctic coast at the mouth of the Coppermine river.

Last year Dr. L. D. Livingstone was sent North with the 1928 Canadian Arctic Expedition to the posts in the eastern islands of the Arctic archipelago and made his headquarters at Pangnirtung on Baffin Island. Later Dr. J. A. Urquhart proceeded to the western Arctic and established himself at Alkavik at the mouth of the Mackenzie river. When the 1929 Arctic Expedition leaves North Sydney, Nova Scotia, about July 20 on board the S.S. Beothic, it will include a ne-w medical officer to relieve Dr. Livingstone at Pangnirtung. The change will be made during the southern leg of the patrol and Dr. Livingstone will accompany the Beothic to Chesterfield Inlet where the materials and supplies will be landed for the new medical post. It is expected Dr. Livingstone will continue the trip on the Beothic to the home port and will submit his report to the North West Territories and Yukon Branch at Ottawa. Later, probably in January 1930, he will set out for Chesterfield Inlet where he will remain as Departmental Medical Officer for a year or more. Plans for the establishment of the medical officer at the mouth of the Coppermine river are being formulated.

The Department of the Interior through its North West Territories and Yukon Branch, in addition is co-operating with the Department of Indian Affairs in maintaining medical officers at different points in the Northwest Territories. These officers, who are given the status of Medical Health Officers, are Dr. W. A. J. Truesdell, Simpson; Dr. C. Bourget, Resolution; and Dr. A. L. McDonald, Fort Smith, all in Mackenzie District.—Natural Resources.

Sir Esme's Hobby Is Bookbinding

Advocates a Humble Hobby as a Means to Happiness

Princeton, N.J.—Sir Esme Howard, British Ambassador at Washington, on his retirement from the diplomatic service next year, plans to devote much of his time to bookbinding, he said in a speech recently to the literary and political societies of Princeton University.

"You young people of America, and also our young people in England, can add much to your own happiness and also the happiness of the world generally, if you will learn not only to appreciate beautiful things but also to create them within the measure of your capacity.

"There is nothing—apart from the ever-important cultivation of the spiritual values—which your country and my country need so much as the cultivation of the aesthetic values.

"Unfortunately for myself, I may say that I never learned any handicraft, and that source of creative happiness is at present denied me. But I hope to make good this defect when I retire from diplomatic life next year, and to become perhaps an enthusiastic if belated bookbinder. I should like to think I had persuaded one or two of you here present to try your hand at such humble work, and so assure to yourselves many happy hours."

Under Arctic Seas

By Submarine to the North Pole—It Sounds Like Jules Verne, But Sir Hubert Wilkins Means to Make It Actual Fact

Some wonderful voyages have been accomplished by submarine, but even the greatest of them seems a very matter-of-fact affair compared with the exploit which Sir Hubert Wilkins, the famous airman and explorer, is planning for next summer. He intends to cross the North Pole by submarine, sailing under the Arctic ice for 2,000 miles from Spitzbergen to the Behring Sea.

At first mention the project seems wildly impossible. But the Polar Sea is between 5,000 and 15,000 feet deep, and the average thickness of the ice is from 10 ft. to 15 ft. Sir Hubert does not think that it is thicker than 120 ft. anywhere, and Dr. Stefansson agrees that a submarine cruising at a depth of 150 ft. should have nothing to fear from ice.

There is a snag, however, which makes the enterprise a dangerous one. A submarine can only travel about 200 miles when submerged. After it has travelled this distance it has to come to the surface.

Breaking Through the Ice
This might seem to dispose of the submarine idea at once, but only to those who don't know the Arctic. The Polar Sea is not completely ice-bound; on an average, the submarine should come to a patch of open sea once in every twenty-five miles or so. Practically at the Pole itself explorers have found channels in the ice.

Even if these channels are not encountered, it will be possible to break through the ice by means of blasting, if the submarine retreats for about half a mile after laying the charge.

This, at any rate, is the calculation, but the risks that will be taken by an expedition of this kind are obvious. It is said, however, that this is the best way in which to obtain information regarding the depth of the Arctic Ocean and the behaviour of its currents.

It would probably be possible to get the same information by employing a powerful ice-breaker, and "breaking through" to the Pole. In the search for Amundsen and the men lost with the Itala, the ice-breaking Krassin attained the most northerly point ever reached by a ship sailing freely, and could have gone still farther north. Her commander believes that a more powerful ice-breaker could undoubtedly reach the Pole.

Up to the present three methods of Arctic exploration have been successfully employed. Peary put his trust in dogs; Dr. Nansen employed ships and sledges in combination; Amundsen showed what aircraft could do. A voyage to the Pole either by ice-breaker or submarine would add a new chapter to the history of adventure and enterprise in the Frozen North.

Unseen Eye

The day before the battle of the Dogger Bank the Admiralty were in possession of the whole of the plans of the German Navy, and during the battle they were intercepting and solving orders in code. Similarly the battle of Jutland was watched by the unseen eye of the Admiralty.

Zeppelins on their way back from bombing raids were very loquacious, and submarines used to wireless home their "bag." It was Room 40 which decoded the message from the "U20," giving full details of the sinking of the "Lusitania."

Perhaps the most spectacular thing accomplished by Room 40 was the decoding of the now notorious "Zimmerman" message which brought the United States into the war. The message was the offer to Mexico by Germany of an alliance against the United States.

When the message was received it was conveyed secretly to Lord Balfour and sent to President Wilson, who had it published in the American Press. That message turned the scales and the United States entered the war on the side of the Allies.

When I talked to Sir Alfred Ewing in the book-lined library of his house in Edinburgh it was impossible to associate this silver-haired, old, quiet-mannered scholar with a soft Scots accent with the activities of feverish days and nights in Room 40 during the war.

Manchester Guardian (Lib.): If the airplane justifies itself in survey work there is every reason to hope that much more than the 4,000 miles at present known of a coast-line that is put at some 10,000 may be charted.
