**WHITCHURCH TAX RATE ADVANCED**

Local Rate Advanced Only 2 Mills But County and H.S. Demand Increase.

Wm Crawford clerk and treasurer of Whitchurch, presented the half-yearly statement to the council on Saturday at the regular monthly meeting held at Vandorf. Reeve Herman Kidd presided over the meeting with present Deputy-Reeve Williams, Councillors Ratcliff, Rae and Evans.

The statement of the treasurer showed that receipts to date amounted to \$18,099.52, with expenditures running \$20,674.57. The receipts are chiefly made up of two items, the largest of which is the government cheque for roads. The second important source of this revenue is \$8,000 from overdue taxes, while the remaining receipts are derived from numerous small items.

The council went carefully into the matter of finance and then struck the tax rate for the year as follows:—

County rate 9 1/2 mills  
General rate 10 mills  
General school rate 3 9-10ths mills  
H.S. attendance levy 1 7-10th mills

The general township rate is advanced two mills over last year, due to some heavy expenditure owing to the bad flood storm last spring, and from one or two other causes. The county and High School rate is also increased, but council have no power over these items.

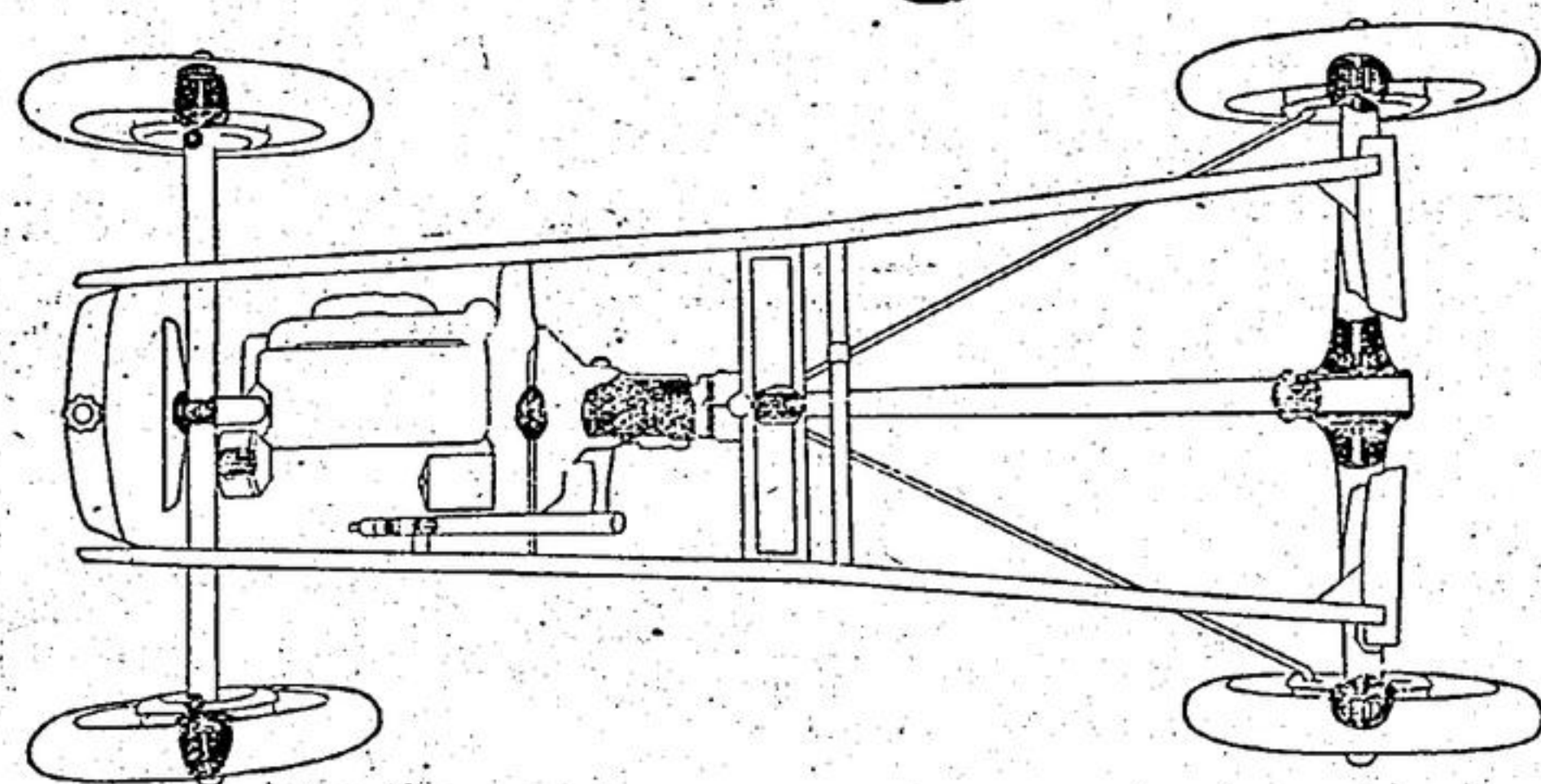

# 24 BALL and ROLLER Bearings



**Reduces Friction and Makes for Ease of Operation**
