Another artesian well was located last Saturday on the premises of the Toronto Gold Fish Co. a mile and a quarter north of Ringwood between the Sth and 9th concession lines. Work of sinking wells on this week. property is being watched by the local authorities with more than ordinary interest, because there is feared to be just a small element of danger that the sinking of wells within such close proximity to the Stouffville water supply may deplete the town wells. We learn from legal authority that there is no law on the statute books to prohibit drilling wells in wholesale quantities even for commercial purposes. Therfore the only redress that could be looked for would be for those who are injured to appeal to the Private Bills Committee of the next parliament for some act which would stop drilling . for commercial purposes where such drilling is causing, or liable to cause damage to a necessary water supply.
