

Scarce Due to Drought

Coming at the close of a ter weeks drought, almost unparalleled in the history of the province, Tuesday, Wednesday Thursday last week there was a downpour of rain, pretty general all over the country will prove a God-send to the farmers and general public. Bumper Apple Crop.

One thing the farmers have succeeded in getting well out of the way, is the picking of apples. An exceptionally good crop, in which the Northern Spys, Greenings and other well known varieties predominate, was garnered. Down along the lake front counties, such as South Ontario, Durham and Northumberland, reports agree as to the adundance and quality of the yield.

The one serious phase which confronts the average Ontario farmer at the present time and will become accentuated, is the scarcity of winter feed, and the fact that dairy and beef cattle are going into winter quarters in poor shape to maintain the quantity and quality of milk, cream and butter. Ensilage corn for the most part was less than half an average crop, mangolds and turnips half a crop, and some of this has already been drawn upon.
