## AN ACCLAMATION IN WHITCHURCH

As forecast in The Tribune last week, Whitchurch council was returned by acclamation for 1930. In anticipation of this the enthusiasm did not run so high at the nomination meeting on Monday. Only the best of feeling prevailed and criticism was noticeably absent.

Reeve H. Kidd called attention to the annual increase in County rates, and attributed much of the increase to the High School Act adopted by York County, Mother's Allowance, County and Provincial roads, all of which had jumped in an alarming manner. The York Road Commission alone which spent 10 years ago \$158,000, last year spent \$247,500. The reeve received an attentive hearing, as did all the speakers.

The only question asked was why did the banks charge the taxpayers 10c. for accepting their tax money, when council paid an assessor to do the collecting. Strong opposition was evidenced to this principal although the individual amount was small.

Kidd said the banks were constantly seeking new sources of revenue. They agreed to all make a charge as above stated. Rates can avoid the 10c. collection charge by paying direct to the collector. Last year the council paid the banks for making these collections, but this means that the rate payer who went to the collector to pay was also helping to pay for the fellow who used the convenience of the bank.

Ex-Reeve Morgan Baker said he had no intention to run for office. He wondered what would happen if taxes continued to mount for the next five years as they had the past year. Mr. Baker spoke on County equalization for a short time, showing its disadvantage to northern sections.

Deputy-Reeve Wes. Williams and Councilors Ratcliff, Rae and Evans all spoke briefly on various phases of the year's work. Isaac Morton, the new nominee for council said he would not put the rate payer's burden in the good condition they were before the flood.

Besides the 1929 council, only two new persons were nominated, being Morgan Baker for reeve and Isaac Morton for council. Both withdrew leaving an acclamation of the old council as follows:—

Reeve—H. Kidd.  
 Deputy-Reeve—Wes. Williams.  
 Councilors—Ross Ratcliff, Newton Rae and Lorne Evans.

There is a run for Councilors only in Pickering. Luther Middleton last year's 1st deputy is reeve by acclamation. E. L. Chapman, 1st deputy by acclamation and Allan Moore, 2nd deputy by acclamation. The contest for council is between R. Reesor, Dr. McKuen, F. K. Rittenhouse and Ralph Mowbray.

## NO ELECTION IN STOUFFVILLE

The nomination meeting in Stouffville on Monday evening created a big interest and the attendance was the largest in years. The old council is all returned by acclamation as well as three members to the school board. H. O. Klinck was elected by acclamation to the Cemetery Commission in lieu of A. S. Collins.

There were three nominations for reeve, being J. Borinsky, H. W. Sanders and W. D. Morden. Reeve Sanders gave a brief outline of the year's work, while Mr. Morden spoke in a more critical manner. He declared the financial statement of the town was incomplete, an old complaint. It didn't give the ratepayers the information they are entitled to, he thought.

Councillor Borinsky advocated more work being done to beautify our town as a residential centre.

All the councillors spoke on the various phases of municipal work under their direct charge, while Councillor Ward took a panoramic view of council proceedings. He divided that into two sections—the "living and the dead"—the Reeve and Councillor Rusnell being on one end and himself with Councilors Rowbotham and Borinsky on the other. Councillor Ward took special delight in criticizing Councillor Rusnell for his work as head of the street committee. He claimed his colleague only used one part of the harness—the brooding—and if he was returned he would put a few tacks in it.

Councillor Rusnell described as false some of these complaints laid against his management of gravelling the roads.

A. V. Nolan gave a short outline on the financial situation of our schools which carried an overly large surplus this year despite a cut in the mill rate for school purposes.

John McKinnon was nominated for council but was not present at the meeting. A. C. Burkholder, Wm. Armstrong, Jacob Meyer and Frank Baker were also nominated, but all withdrew.

The meeting displayed a good spirit, all speakers being given a good hearing. J. S. Dougherty acted as chairman. The acclamations are as follows:—

Reeve—H. W. Sanders.  
 Councilors—J. Borinsky, A. J. Ward, D. H. Rusnell and F. C. Rowbotham.

School Board for 2 year term—Edw. Baker, Ed. Lloyd and A. V. Nolan.

## MARKHAM'S BYLAW

Next Monday Markham Township ratepayers will vote on a bylaw to provide for the raising of \$25,000 by debenture for the purpose of paying for the new bridges needed, and other damage done by the flood last spring. The money has been spent, and if an adverse vote is taken to spreading the payment over five years as provided by this bylaw, the 1930 council may be faced with making payment by raising the money all in the year 1930.

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## STOUFFVILLE CONTINUATION SCHOOL

Parents will please note that, in addition to the above report, individual report cards are sent to each parent to be signed. In case of not receiving one please communicate with the Principal at once. As the year's standing in the first and second years in the High School is based entirely upon the term marks, and as each pupil must obtain an average of 50% on the total year's mark in a subject to get credit in that subject, parents are asked to co-operate strongly with the teachers so that the pupil does satisfactory work right along.

It must be remembered that the Government regulate the Course and the System. The Department of Education requires that a pupil of the first year do an average of at least 1 1/2 hours homework each night to obtain results. A pupil of the second year should do at least 2 hrs. per night. A pupil of the third year is expected to do at least 2 1/2 hrs. per night. This amount of homework is given and if pupils do not do it then they are continually holding back the class and it makes it much harder for the teachers.

Regular attendance is absolutely necessary. One day missed here or there frequently means as much as three days lost because the pupil misses homework, new work, old homework taken up. As there are three teachers dividing the work, it makes it far worse for the one who is absent. In almost every case the ones who are at the head of the class or have complete standing have been regular in attendance.

The present staff came new to the school in September, it cannot be expected of them to know the strength and weakness of every pupil from the beginning. There has been the best of co-operation between the staff and they are conscientiously endeavoring to give their best efforts to obtain the best possible results.
