DEBENTURE BY-LAW

TOWNSHIP OF MARKHAM

By-law to provide for the borrow-
ing of twenty-five thousand dollars
(\$25,000.00) upon debentures, to pay
for the construction of the following
bridges:—Bridge, lots 15 and 16,
concession 5, costing \$2435.00;

Bridge, lots 25 and 26, concession 5,
costing \$2263.00; Bridge, lots 20
and 21, concession 5, costing \$6334-
51; Bridge, lot 29, concession 6, and
lot 28, concession 7, costing \$2312.21

Bridge, lots 25 and 26, concession 8,
costing \$2196.00; Bridge, lots 15
and 16, concession 10, costing \$2635-
25; Bridge, lots 25 and 26, conces-
sion 8, costing \$4850.00; Bridge,
lot 20 and 21, concession 10, cost-
ing \$1352.50; Approaches to Bridges
costing \$618.53, the total cost being
\$25,000.00, in the Township of
Markham, in the County of York.

WHEREAS pursuant to resolu-
tions of the Council of the Township
of Markham the Reeve and Clerk
were authorized and instructed to
sign a contract or contracts for the
construction of the above named
bridges.

AND WHEREAS the total cost of
the work is \$25,000.00, which is to
be provided for out of the special
assessment on the whole Corpora-
tion.

AND WHEREAS the lifetime of
the work is estimated at thirty years.

AND WHEREAS it is necessary to
borrow the said sum of \$25,000.00
upon the credit of the Corporation
and to issue debentures therefor bear-
ing interest at the rate of five and one
half per cent per annum, which is
the amount of the debt intended to
be created by this by-law.

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to
make the principal of the said debt
repayable in yearly sums during the
period of five years, of such amounts
respectively that the aggregate am-
ount payable for principal and inter-
est in any years shall be equal as
nearly as may be to the amount so
payable for principal and interest in
each of the other years.

AND WHEREAS it will be neces-
sary to raise annually for five years,
the sum of \$5854.41 during the
period of five years, to pay the year-
ly sums of principal and interest as they
become due.

AND WHEREAS the amount of
the whole rateable property of the
Municipality, according to the last
Revised Assessment Roll, is \$5,347-
845.

AND WHEREAS the amount of
the existing debenture debt of the
Corporation (exclusive of Local Im-
provement debts secured by special
rates or assessments) is \$ nil and no
part of the principal and interest is
in arrears.

THEREFORE THE MUNICIPAL
COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION
OF THE TOWNSHIP OF MARK-
HAM, ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:—

(1) That for the purpose afore-
said there shall be borrowed on the

credit of the Corporation at large
the sum of \$25,000.00, and debentures
shall be issued therefor in
sums of not less than One hundred
dollars (\$100.00) each, bearing in-
terest at the rate of five and one half
per centum per annum, having cou-
pons attached thereto for the pay-
ment of interest.

(2) The debentures shall all bear
the same date and shall be issued
within two years after the date on
which this By-law is passed and may
bear any date within such 2 years,
and shall be payable in five annual
instalments during the five years
after the time that the same are
issued, and the respective amounts of
principal and interest payable in each
of such years shall be as in Schedule
attached.

(3) The debentures as to both
principal and interest shall be ex-
pressed in Canadian Currency and
shall be payable at the office of the
Treasurer of the Township of Mark-
ham.

(4) The Reeve of the Corporation
shall sign and issue the debentures
and interest coupons and the same
shall also be signed by the Treasurer
of the Corporation, and the debentures
shall be sealed with the seal of
the Corporation.

(5) During the five years, the
currency of the debentures, the sum
of \$5854.41 shall be levied and raised
annually for the payment of the
debt and interest by a special rate
sufficient therefor over and above all
other rates, on all the rateable prop-
erty in the Municipality, at the
same time and in the same manner
as other rates.

(6) The Debentures may contain
any clause providing for the regis-
tration thereof authorized by any
Statute relating to Municipal Debentures
in force at the time of issue
thereof.

This By-law shall take effect on
the date of the final passing thereof,
after the same has received the assent
of the electors of the Munic-
ipality.

five o'clock in the afternoon, at the
Council Chamber, Unionville, Ontario
is the time and place which has been
fixed for the appointment of persons

to attend at the various polling places
and at the final summing up of the
votes by the Municipal Clerk on be-
half of the persons interested in and
promoting or opposing the By-law.

Notice is further given that a
tenant whose lease extends for the
time for which the debt or liability
is to be created or in which the
money to be raised by the proposed
By-law is payable or for at least
twenty-one years and who has by his
or her lease covenanted to pay all
Municipal taxes in respect of the
property, other than Local Improvement
rate, if he she makes and files with
the Clerk of the Municipality not
later than the 10th day before the
day appointed for taking the vote, a
Declaration under "The Canada
Evidence Act", so stating, shall be
entitled to have his or her name
entered on the list of voters entitled
to vote on the said By-law.

Every such tenant who desires to
vote for or against the By-law must
deliver such Declaration to the
Clerk not later than the 27th day of
December, 1929.

Every Corporation entitled to ap-
point a nominee to vote on its be-
half, which desires to vote on the
proposed By-law, shall not later than
the 27th day of December, 1929, file
with the Municipal Clerk an appoint-
ment in writing of a person to vote
as its nominee and on its behalf.

Notice is further given that if the
assent of the Electors is obtained
thereto the said By-law will be taken
into consideration by the Municipal
Council of the Township of Markham
after the expiration of one month
from the 12th day of December, 1929
being the date of the first publica-
tion of this Notice.

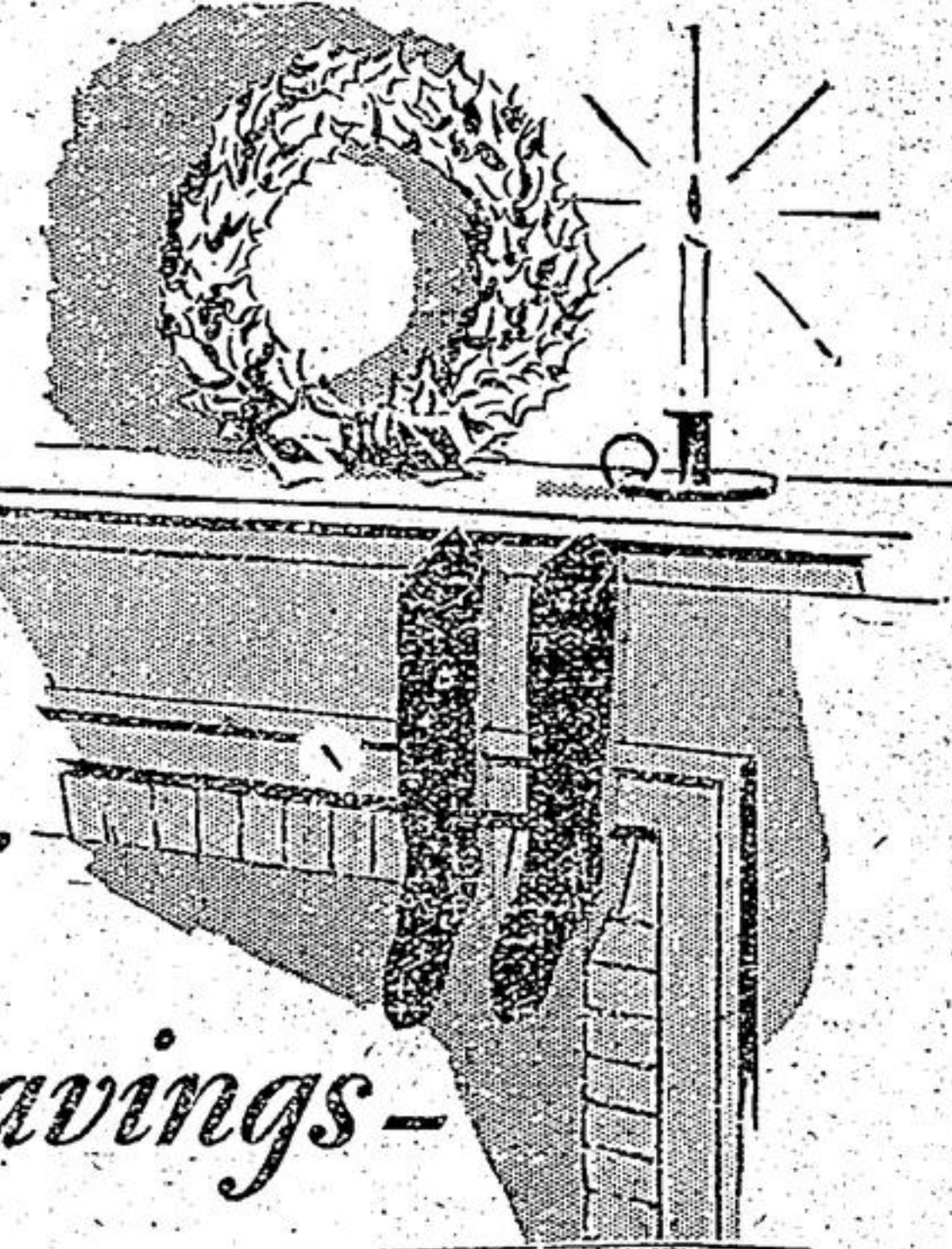

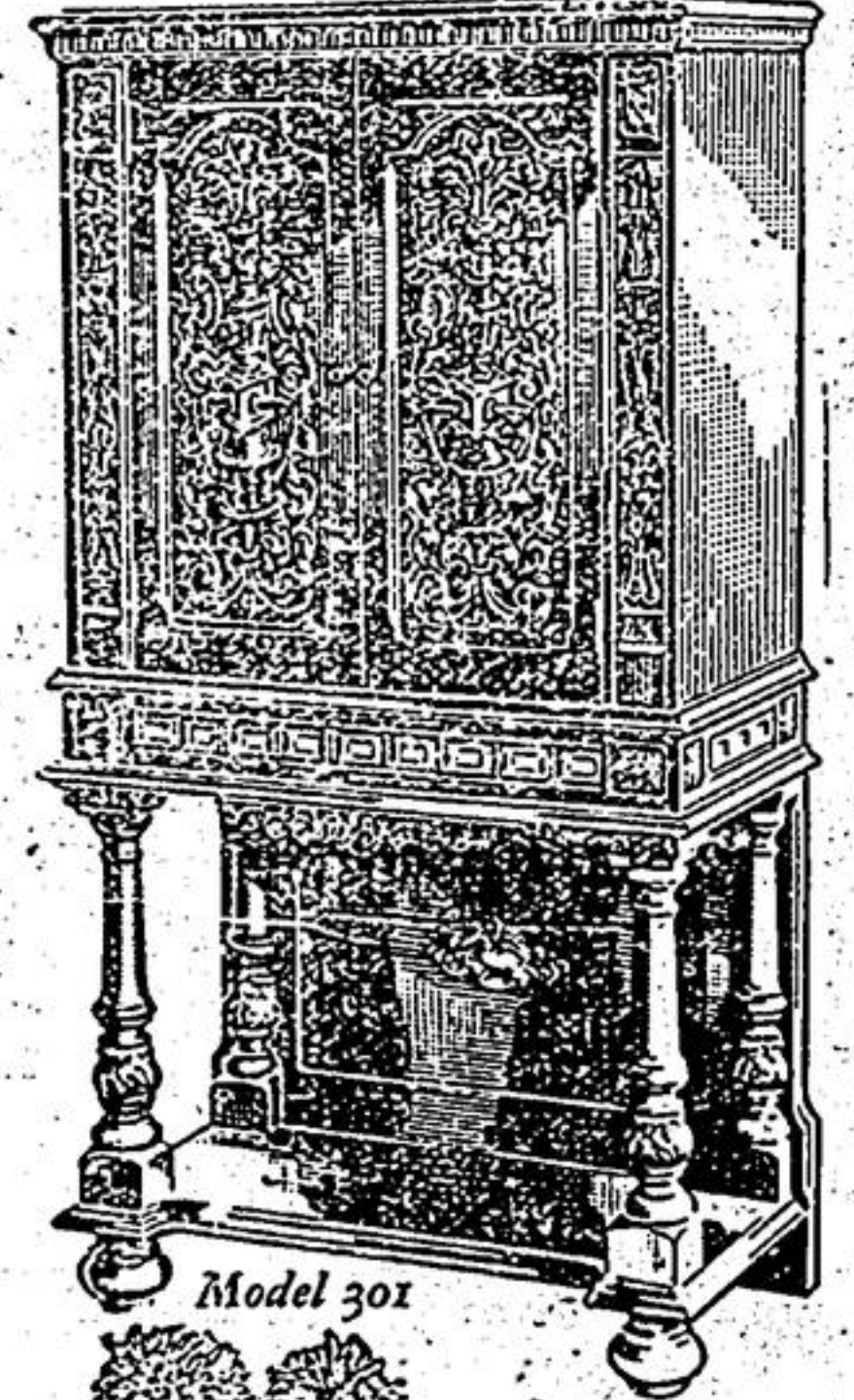
