### NOTES AND COMMENTS

Wouldn't it be nice if civic elections were held in Toronto only every other year?

Every 24 hours Wall Street in tolling the ticker news of the big markets uses no less than 4,500,000 feet or 850 miles of ticker tape. This is a normal day run, and does not take into account any frenzied market movements.

Palmerston town council had intended to submit the matter to the electors in January of having a certain portion of their council elected for two year terms. It was found out, however, that such a system of municipal council election is not provided for under the present statutes of Ontario.

Says the Barrie Examiner—"The old scriptural injunction that 'the poor you have always with you,' is as true today as it was when uttered two thousand years ago, says the Walkerton Herald. But instead of Lazarus sitting at the gate and dogs licking his sores, we have the indigents listening in on the radio or playing the piano at the House of Refuge, and in fact so happy and contented are they that when 29 of them were granted the Old Age Pension the other day, they with one accord, decided to remain in the Refuge and let the world roll on, the county going through the formality of collecting the money and applying it towards their keep. But Walkerton, which a critic described as the home of 'Pride, Poverty and Pianos,' comes to the front with bells on in the matter of Old Age Pensions and leads all other municipalities in the county with 21 pensioners on the list.

"A flurry was created in Almonte municipal circles when it became known that all members of the Board of Education, who numbered among them some of the most influential citizens of Almonte, had resigned in a body. This action followed a period of opposition by the Town Council to the Board of Education. The board, acting in concert with provincial authorities to carry out departmental demands for better school accommodations at the least possible expense to the ratepayers, requested the Town Council to submit a by-law to the ratepayers. The Council refused. Litigation resulted and while the Council won on a technicality, the matter is by no means settled. The members of the board, feeling that they cannot make headway, have resigned to make room for the appointment of those who have been opposing the board and in hope that these opponents have a better policy which will solve the educational problems of Almonte. At the nomination meeting no names were put in nomination, and it was stated that another meeting would have to be held."

We have heard the complaint made that churches paid too much attention to the collection plate and talked too much about money. In this way people were being driven away or kept away from church. It always did seem that such criticism was more invented than real, because most of the churches around here are quite free from excessive collecting methods.

Listening to some of the Sunday evening sermons and services that come over the radio from United States gives one the idea, though, that some of this criticism is not so very far off the mark.

A recent Sunday evening there was the start of some large campaign in Buffalo; a great evangelist was brought there for the occasion, and there was so great a crowd that people were standing.

Then came the announcement about the offering and the prayer before it was taken. In that prayer a preacher asked the Lord not to allow any person to give more than he should, and also not let any person escape without putting in all that he was able to contribute.

That did seem to be a sort of a tub-thumping way to unburden the soul to Almighty God. We can't imagine by any stretch of the imagination that the Lord would look over the results of that collection in Buffalo and suit a special blessing to each contributor, such as was suggested in the prayer.

We doubt whether the Lord pays much attention to many such petitions. People who make them are sitting in churches that are mighty comfortable places; they are listening to ten thousand dollar pipe organs and paid singers. There is plenty of evidence of wealth all around them.

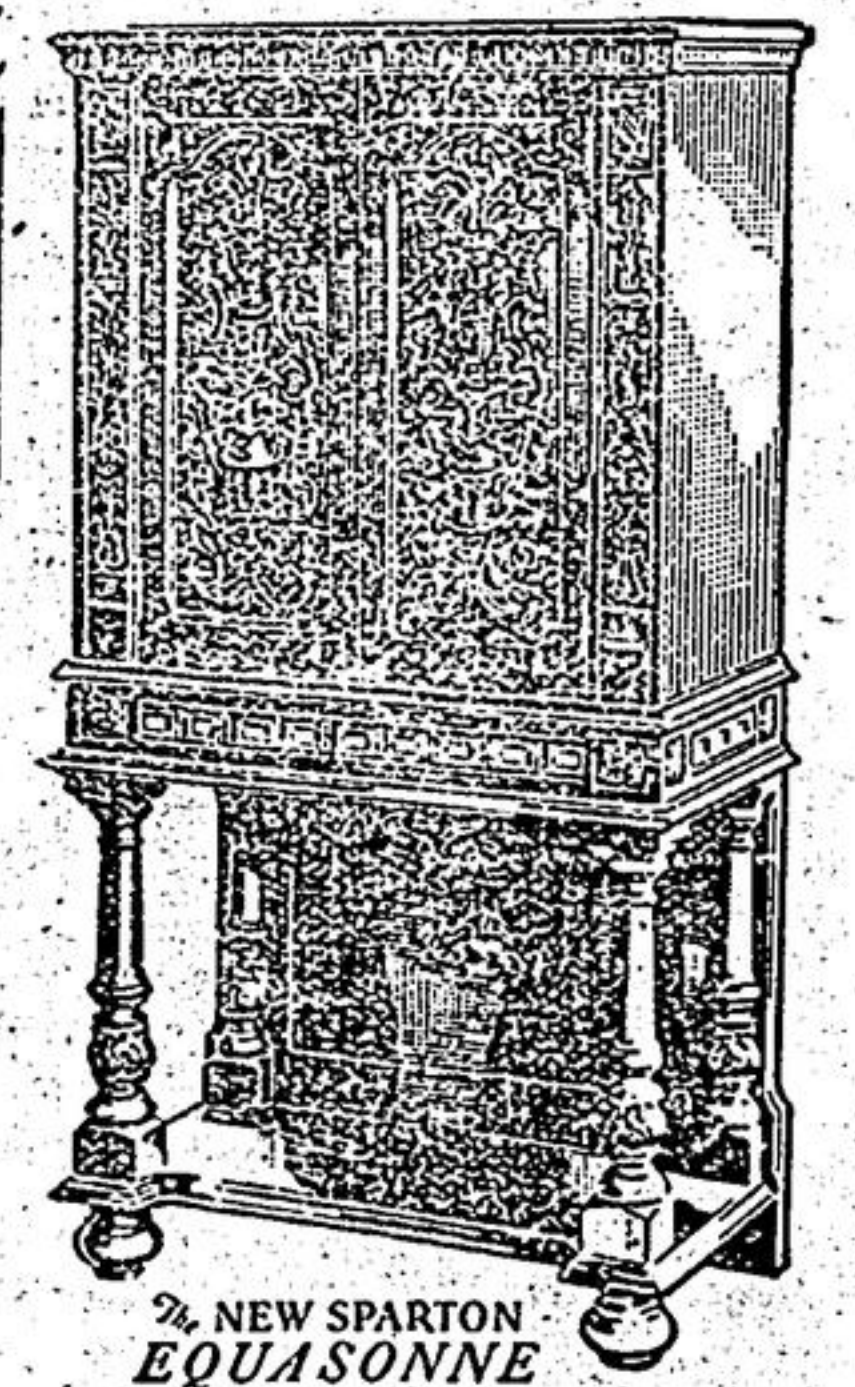
