UXBRIDGE COUNCIL INAUGURAL MEET

Treasurer's Position is to be Re-Opened

The inaugural meeting of Uxbridge Township Council on Monday was full of interest, because of the change in personnel on the Board. The members took office as follows:—
Reeve—Owen Davies
Dep. Reeve—Geo. E. Todd
Councillors—Thos. H. Lewis, Robt. Pickard, James H. Wagg.
Reeve Davies addressed the council and said he hoped for the greatest co-operation and harmony among the members.

Applications were received from Fred Johnston, Fred Feasby and Russel Feasby for the position of auditors. The first-mentioned two were appointed.

E. W. Davis was the only applicant for the job of school attendance officer; R. E. Faulkner, the only one for assessor, and Howard W. Harper for treasurer.

E. W. Davis was appointed as S. A. O. at a salary of \$50 and postage. Disten McDonald was re-appointed tax collector, and Ernest Morgason a member of the Board of Health.

Deputy-reeve Todd gave notice that he would move, at the February meeting to introduce a bylaw appointing a treasurer. W. Smalley is the present incumbent of the office. The principal account passed was for election expenses of \$70.

W. M. Crosskey, Agl. representative, requested a grant of \$15 to help finance the agricultural courses new being held in the town of Uxbridge. Council declined to make any grant as when the courses were held in Goodwood they neither asked for or received any outside help.

D. J. Kean sent an acc. for \$20 for engineering services on Noble bridge. Same was laid over for further investigation.

W. C. Pollard, Mayor of Uxbridge town, wrote the council that on account of so much petty thieving going on he wished to know if council would be favorable to the appointment of Provincial Police to be stationed in this vicinity. The services of same would be paid by the province. Council concurred in his view and instructed the clerk to so write him.

Councillors Pickard and Wagg brought in the report of the standing committee which was adopted, appointing the following committees:—

Finance—Todd, Pickard, Wagg.
Road & Bridge—Reeve & Council
Printing—Wagg, Todd, Lewis.
Indigent—Pickard, Lewis, Wagg.
Contingent—Lewis, Todd, Pickard
Deputy-reeve Todd and Councillor Pickard moved a resolution which was carried appointing to the Community Park Board, Owen Davies, Geo. E. Todd for 1930; Dr. Darling, J. F. Reid, John Ashenhurst, Thos. Armstrong, Mrs. E. W. Davis for 2 years.

Clerk was instructed by council to write John W. McCullough for information, re the \$1,000 bequest of the late Jas. McCullough to the poor of Goodwood, as to who has distribution of same.

Mr. Pickard gave notice that he will at next meeting of council move for leave to introduce a bylaw to appoint Pound Keepers, Sheep valuers and Fence viewers.
Council adjourned to Feb'y 15th.
