#### MARKHAM COUNCIL

##### FIRST MEETING

Hundred Dollar Reward Given For Capture of Chicken Thief.

The inaugural meeting of Markham Township Council was presided over by Reeve W. C. Gohn and all the members were present. The session was featured by harmony and despatch in the transaction of the business, and the members adjourned at an early hour.

Reeve Gohn suggested that the council consider the advisability of increasing the salary of the road superintendent. He pointed out that the present salary of \$1200 per year was inadequate and that he felt the man would not be overpaid at \$1500. The government pays one half the salary of the road superintendent. The superintendent has driven his car as far as 800 miles per month in the execution of his duties. The council will probably deal with the question at the next meeting.

Communications were read and disposed of after which the following resolutions were passed:

Bylaw for issuing debentures for \$25,000 was given third reading. Padgett-Coakwell. That the Reeve and Treasurer be instructed to hypothecate this debenture issue with the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Unionville, until such time as the township consider it advisable to dispose of same.

Padgett-Coakwell: That the Treasurer be authorized to pay the following grants:—Thornhill Public Library, \$15.00; Unionville Public Library, \$15; Hospital for sick children, \$15.

Padgett-Coakwell: That the Treasurer be authorized to pay each Deputy Returning Officer in the recent election \$5; each poll clerk \$3; constables, \$2; rent of booths, \$3 each; Returning Officer \$10 for delivering ballot boxes and deputies 10 cents per mile for returning boxes.

Stiver-Padgett: That whereas conditions existing on Yonge Street which is Provincial Highway demand that sidewalks or foot paths be laid down and the Provincial Government has acquired certain land on the west side of this Highway from which fences have not been moved. Be it resolved that the Department of Public Highways be notified that as soon as said Department removes fences, the Township of Markham is willing to carry on the work of building said walks on Yonge st.

The Board of Health members were appointed as follows: Reeve Gohn, Dr. C. R. McKay, M. O. James Gibson, G. A. M. Davison, Secretary.

Mr. and Mrs. W. Luskey, of Thornhill were allowed a reward of \$100 for the capture of a chicken thief recently. It will be recalled that a couple of weeks ago Mr. and Mrs. Luskey captured and turned over to the authorities a chicken thief who was in the act of raiding their chicken roost. The intruder has since been sentenced to two years in Kingston and the township in accordance with motion made some time ago voted the reward.

J. A. Thompson, of Thornhill, was reappointed as assessor for the west half of the township at a salary of \$325 and H. R. Forster was appointed as auditor for the municipality at a salary of \$200.

#### Here and There

Running well ahead of schedule work on the 21 story addition to the Empire's largest hotel, the Royal York, additional construction is being rapidly pushed forward and the sixth story is now completed. All steel work is expected to be finished early in February and everything will be completed by June 1st, when there will be a total of 1,181 guest rooms at this palatial Toronto hotel.

Hitting a 90-mile an hour clip, a special Canadian Pacific train recently carried two-and-a-half-year-old Delphis Morin, who was thought to be dying of intestinal influenza, from Sudbury to Toronto, for a blood transfusion in the Toronto Western Hospital. Leaving at 10.55 the train reached destination at 6.35, all traffic having been held aside for the special. At 8 the operation was performed and half an hour later the boy was smiling at his friends. He is now well on his way to recovery.

Fighting against Atlantic winter gales the cable ship John W. MacKay has just successfully completed another epic of the seas in effecting repairs to the high speed cable of the Commercial Cable Company over which much of Canadian Pacific cable business is carried to Europe. The cable was smashed in the great quake of November 18, the break being discovered within 36 hours of the arrival of the ship on the scene. Raising the cable from a depth of 2½ miles and at a point 80 miles from the western end of the break being part of the job to be done.

"Canary Kornbyke Alcarta" a five-year-old Holstein Friesian cow, which a year ago claimed the world's championship as a butter-fat producer, with 26,396 pounds of butter-fat in 305 days, has beaten her own record. Following her record for "Canary Kornbyke Alcarta" is "30-80" pounds of milk with 1,336.25 pounds of butter-fat.

Honey to the amount of 55,181 pounds was produced in Nova Scotia in 1928, according to official figures, and the 1929 output will likely be much larger as the summer season of that year was much more favorable, says Philip Bishop, of Greenwich (Port William), the largest bee-keeper in Nova Scotia.

Within four to five years thousands of farmers throughout the province of Saskatchewan will have the benefit of all-weather roads running in all directions. The provincial government plans to spend \$5,000,000 annually during the next few years on the construction of six main highways, all weather surfaced.

Notwithstanding the growing popularity of the motor car and motor power farm implements, the horse is evidently not going into the discard as rapidly as some people might be inclined to believe. Latest official estimate of number of farm horses in Canada as in June, 1929, is placed at 3,776,487. In 1919 the number was 3,677,369, a difference of only 29,882.

About 50,000 tons of hay have recently been exported from Eastern Ontario and Quebec to buyers in the British Isles. The 1929 exports of hay from Canada are greatly in excess of those of 1928. About
