NOTES AND COMMENTS

The annual meeting of Markham Township Conservative Association will be held next Friday, Jan. 31st, at Unionville, in the Township Hall. The hour of meeting is 2 o'clock. Robt. Stiver is president, and J. A. Gibson, secretary.

Owing to the technicality of the Returning Officer in not having the candidates who stood for election sign a declaration of qualification for office a new nomination will be held at Tara. This will include Reeve, Councillors and School Trustees.

There is at least one conscientious man in Wingham—Robert Spotton. He was elected to the town council but finds through private reasons he cannot take his seat at the council board, so he has resigned. When submitting his resignation in writing, he enclosed a \$10 bill to cover the cost of new nomination proceedings.

Another discovery which may prove a great boon to humanity is reported from Calcutta by a noted Indian scientist who claims to have developed a powerful heart stimulant which has restored life after all heart action had ceased. The new drug is derived from a plant found in the Himalaya mountains, and its discoverer predicts that it will in time supersede such heart stimulants as strychnine and digitalis.

Ontario's general election on October 30 last, cost approximately \$550,000. Accounts to the amount of \$525,000 have already been paid, and in the opinion of Charles A. Fitch, auditor of criminal justice accounts, at Queen's Park between \$20,000 and \$25,000 will cover those still to come in. A large proportion of this total cost is borne by direct taxation, collected by every municipality through its municipal council.

While the financial benefits accruing from tourist traffic are admitted, Dominion Government officials are endeavouring to establish some more accurate method of establishing the value to the country. The present plan of averaging tourist expenditure at \$10. per head per day is veriest guess work. Many

tourists do not spend that amount in ten days and boast of the fact. The system of counting tourists is also to undergo revision, it being shown that the same party has appeared no fewer than four times in the returns as four different parties.

Rt. Hon. T. P. O'Connor, for fifty years a member of the British House of Commons and one of the most prolific writers in England, died the other day leaving an estate valued at \$1,500. Mr. O'Connor was known far and wide for his benevolence but his charitable nature had reduced his accumulations to such a meagre sum. The editor of The Tribune sat at the same table with T. P. on one occasion four years ago in London England, and we thought all present were millionaires but ourselves. We made a miscalculation in the case of the Irish representative, but not in any other case of the titled gentry present. Still, it reminds one how easy it is to be mistaken on the material wealth of individuals.

There is a startling measure before the Legislature of Massachusetts and yet it may signify a natural evolution in public opinion and medicine. The bill is designed to create a state department that would furnish "free and complete medical service to the people." This would be patterned after the bureau of medicine and surgery of the United States navy. The project includes abolishment of the existing departments of public health and of mental diseases, those function to pass to the new government branch. Much has been spoken and written of late concerning the need of a change in medical affairs that would relieve not only the poor but also those of modest means or very expensive medical attention and the Massachusetts plan no doubt is a legislative answer to the plea. It may be an opening wedge for the introduction of some system that will aid the sick at a time when they dare not quibble over costs.

STOUFFVILLE FARMER WINS

Announcement has been made of the winners of 15 scholarships of \$100 each offered by the T. Eaton Co. to members of the 1929 "Royal Party." For York County Alvin S. Wideman, son of Albert. Wideman a mile and a quarter south of Ringwood, is the fortunate young man to represent this county.

The awards were made following examinations held in each county based on the trip and general agriculture. The scholarships are to be applied on a course at O.A.C. In addition Hon. J. S. Martin, minister of Agriculture, is recommending to the government that all tuition fees be remitted for the first two years of the winners' respective courses.

A LUCKY WEATHER PROPHECY

James B. Boves, the sage of Chatsworth, Ontario, has certainly hit it right in his weather prophecies this season. He bases his predictions on the movements of the planets, and these friendly stars living right up to their undertaking with him. Early last October, he foretold that an early winter would commence at the end of November, that we should have an unusual amount of snow during all of December, that Christmas would be a particularly white Christmas, and that the early part of January would be characterized by heavy thaws and floods. Each of these forecasts has been fulfilled to the letter. Scarcely in the memory of this generation has Old Ontario and especially Southern Ontario experienced so early or snowy a winter, a whiter Christmas or a milder, rainier first week of January, accompanied by flooded creeks and raging rivers.

The question now is, will the sage be able to deliver the goods for the rest of the season? His schedule for the remainder of January calls for very high winds, rain, snow and low temperature. The last few days of the month are to be mild that the snow will disappear again. About the sixth of February, there will be a period of very strong winds, heavy rains, and snow, interlarded with some very cold weather. This spell will be followed by mild weather until about the nineteenth of February. After this will come rain, fresh winds, snow, a very cold spell, and then milder weather extending up to the first of March. That is, if Mr. Boves' planets continue on the job.

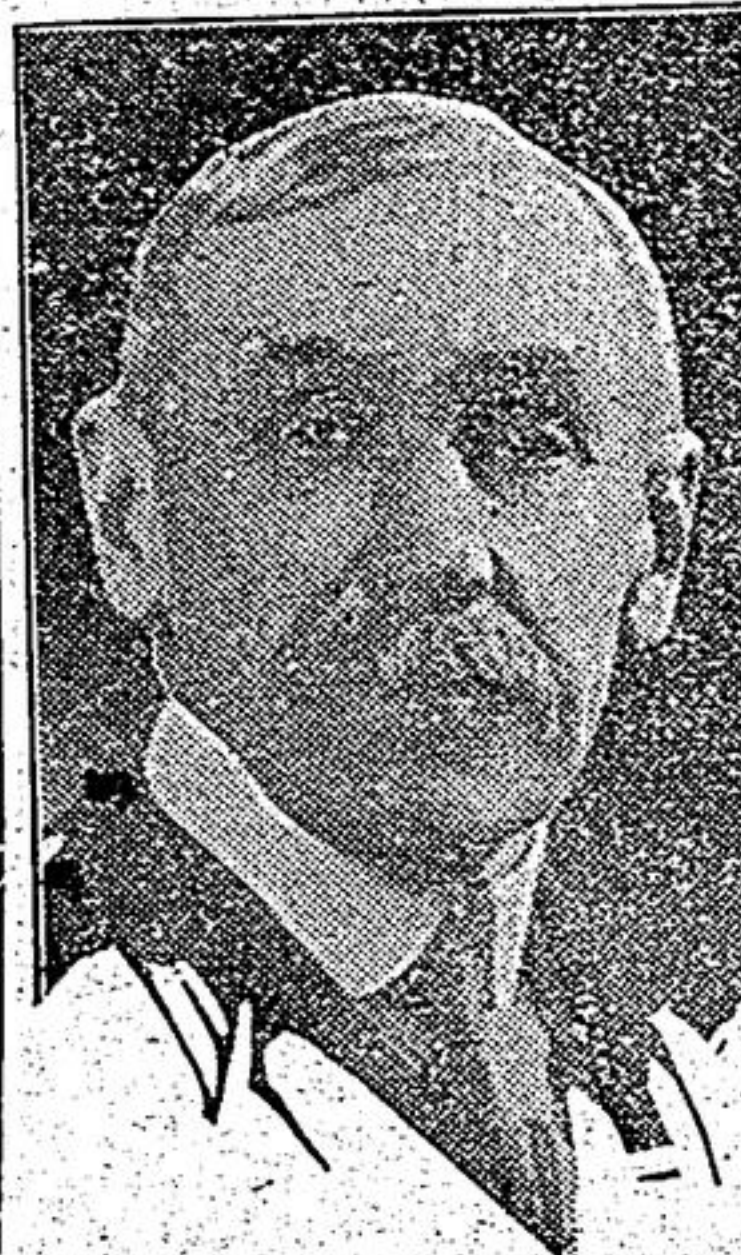
