Contrary to general rumor, the C. N. R. will not adopt daylight saving, or at least no information has been received at the local depot that such a step will be taken as to institute fast time.

Commencing next week the business places in Stouffville will be open three nights each week until October, on Tuesday Thursday and Saturday evenings. Patrons should also note that the stores will close each Wednesday at noon during the same summer months.

Miss Elsie McLuhan, who has quite recovered from the recent illness which overtook her in Stouffville will present her concert in the United Church on Monday evening next, April 28th. All those who purchased tickets for the previous engagement which was cancelled, are entitled to attend this concert without further charge.

Two new trucks have just been placed on the road by local business concerns. The Stouffville Bakery has purchased a Dodge chassis with a modern bakery cab that will facilitate the quick handling of bread in a sanitary manner. The Stouffville Creamery Co. have come along with a nifty new Ford truck which will further improve their creamery service to the farmers.

Good Friday was a very quiet holiday in Stouffville. The weather was unusually fine, but the roads other than the paved ones, prevented motoring becoming popular. There are so many bog holes this season, although the dust is flying on most highways. There wasn't even a concert or special attraction staged as a holiday event here, although many took in the picture theatre in the evening.

Stouffville is to have another general dry goods store to be located in the Lloyd store in the centre of the business section. Mr. Edgar Scott of Newmarket has leased the premises, and will put in a line of dry goods, boots and shoes, also ready-to-wear goods. At present Mr. Scott conducts a store in Newmarket, and will operate the two places for a time at least. For some years the Lloyd block has stood idle, but for many years it was the well known stand of the late J. J. Rae.

Those farmers living in Markham Township along Yonge street to a distance east of one and a quarter mile will vote on the radial proposal on May 3rd. If the township votes itself into the scheme of operating the Metropolitan from Toronto to Richmond Hill, the farmers in the area alone affected will be responsible for any yearly deficit, and the remaining portion of the township will not be held liable for any financial loss. We are informed that Reeve W. C. Gohn is supporting the continued operation of the road, but of course he is not directly interested as his residence is outside the voting area.
