INFORMATION FOR THE BUSY FARMER

(From Dept. of Agriculture)

Egg Production UP
In 1928 there were 34,022,511 egg-producing hens in Canada, a decline of 100,189 over the previous year. They accounted for 263,863,857 dozen eggs or 15,916,300 dozen more than in the previous year. Ontario was the leading egg-producing province and showed a very substantial increase over the preceding year. Quebec was the second highest egg-producing province.

The Calf to Retain

Good judges of cattle can tell, almost at once, whether a calf is worth rearing or not, and that soon after it is born. There are certain signs that cannot be neglected, and by which they are guided in making their selection. A small undersized calf is not one to be retained, for it will but rarely repay the trouble involved in feeding and rearing into a store beast, and thus it had better be taken to market as soon as possible. A lively calf jumping and playing around its dam is what one likes to see, for such a calf is strong on its legs, healthy and should be possessed of a strong constitution.

Borer Still a Menace

Provincial Entomologist, L. Caesar, who is in charge of the enforcement of the corn borer act, recently declared that the impression that the corn borer has been reduced in most counties and that the law will not be strictly enforced this year is fallacious. "The borer is just as dangerous an insect today as it ever was," he declared, "and all it needs is to be given a chance such as it would have if the Corn Borer Act had not been enforced. Corn growers in Ontario will have to become accustomed to the fact that cleaning up corn remnants each spring will be a regular part of farm operations. Non enforcement of the act this year would be folly."

Potato Acreage

"Intention to plant" surveys in the United States suggest an increase. If this happens and a normal or heavy crop is harvested lower prices may be expected next marketing season. Ontario prices for potatoes have been satisfactory this year which may tempt growers to increase acreage. Poor and marginal potato land may come into production and result in an increase of low well advised to direct their energies toward an increased yield per acre of high quality tubers rather than an increase in acreage.

Life of Farm Machinery

It has been found that the average life of a grain binder is sixteen years with a variation from five to thirty-three years. A springtooth harrow, under ordinary service condition, is good only about eight years, while a wagon will hold out for twenty-four years. A survey made recently indicated that the average cost of using a one-row cultivator was eight cents which was about the lowest for any implement. In some instances machines made almost entirely of metal and not housed seemed to last as long as those which were housed. However, other machines with many small parts or parts with wood, cloth or leather, badly need shelter. Binders fall in this class. Investigation reveals that binders which were sheltered required only 1.38 cents per acre for repairs as compared with 2.38c for those not housed.

Better Bull Area

H. A. Dorrance, Agricultural Representative for Brant County, reports that the Brant County Council has passed the necessary bylaw to declare that county a better bull area. A county live stock improvement association has been organized for the constant and permanent improvement of Brant's live stock.

Grow More Barley

A partial solution of the problem of marketing Canada's wheat crop will probably be found in the growing of less wheat and more barley this year anyway. Barley is the great staple grain of the feeder of live stock, yielding the biggest returns expressed in terms of animal nutrition per acre. In other words, more actual food is produced in a normal year from one acre of barley than from any other grain. There is in Ontario, too, a steady market at better than world prices for a large volume of good barley for industrial purposes, and when it comes to the building up of poor soil, or the reclaiming of weed-infested areas, there is no other grain crop that can be utilized to such advantage. The present barley acreage in Ontario is only about one-half of the combined acreage in fall and spring wheat, but present prospects point to this situation being reversed with profits to the producer and the province as a whole.
