MONEY TALKS

"3 Per Cent On Deposits"

"Three per cent is not enough interest. A government bond will pay me 5 per cent, and the bank cannot be any safer than that. Why does the bank not pay more?"

The above question comes to the mind of every thoughtful depositor and it is a perfectly fair question. It can be fairly answered when we realize the difference between a permanent investment and a deposit.

When you take a bond or a mortgage at 5 per cent or 6 per cent you are investing your money for a fixed period, perhaps as long as 20 years. Should you want the money before it is due, you can get it only by transferring the security to someone else in which case, very likely, you have to sell at a little less than you paid.

Though the bank reserves the right to 15 days, or 30 days notice (see the printed regulations in your deposit book) in practice it repays depositors on demand. That means you get your money out whenever you want it. Moreover, the interest is figured on your monthly balance, so that if you have a large sum on hand for just one month you can still earn interest on it.

The deposit in a bank or similar institution is not intended as a permanent investment. It is a place to keep money that is coming and going, or that is being saved up for investment. Some people keep several thousand dollars on deposit, but the bank does not really expect you to do so. It has no objection at all to your withdrawing a sum for investment, and the banks are glad to help you choose investments. Your banker knows that you will probably build up your deposit again, and that the people who have investments are usually the best depositors. Nearly every man and woman has a deposit and each account may change from month to month, but the total always amounts to many millions.

Besides paying 3 per cent interest, the bank allows you to draw cheques, and it has other conveniences for depositors. These advantages now offered to us, were unheard of three hundred years ago. People who were then fortunate enough to have money, or place it in gold or silver, or place it in a goldsmith who was not nearly so reliable as one of our banks, and who actually charged the customer for looking after his money. Banks have been successful because they help people to save their money and to earn interest on it.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

It is needless for this paper to moralize on the call, but the time is opportune to stress the value of maintaining Stouffville's reputation as a place clean and beautiful, even though a trifle long and slim, a place where the citizens are possessed of civic pride which prompts them spring after spring to clean up, plant gardens, fix up the lawns and otherwise beautify properties.

This year with the coming of the Shriners to Toronto in tens of thousands, there will be more American visitors in this locality than ever and we want them to remember this part of Ontario as a place of beauty. Let everyone do his or her part to further this end.

At a special session of the civic council held on Thursday evening last the members consulted with the engineers employed in making a survey for a storm sewer on Main street from the 9th to 10th concession north. It is not advisable at this juncture to quote figures, as the tentative ones given may have to be revised. It is quite evident that the finest class of road that is built is within the figures our property owners would be willing to pay, but the cost of a storm sewer with curbs and gutters, is likely to prove prohibitive, unless the county could be induced to bear at least half the cost of the sewer, which we thing is not too much to ask inasmuch as the presence of such sewer will add many years to the life of any road the county may build here.

NO ONE YET SELECTED FOR SERGT. KIRK'S POST.

Although York County Police Commission considered two applications for the post left vacant through the death of Sergeant Tom Kirk, no action was taken towards recommending an officer for the sergeant's territory.

R. W. Phillips, county police chief, announced, however, a second meeting would be held on May 30 to consider further applications. The chief stated that a recommendation would likely be made at this meeting, to be forwarded to county council at the June session for appointment.

FORMS SENT OUT FOR FEDERAL ELECTION

Tons of election forms were in transit last week to the 245 returning officers spread across the Dominion. But this does not carry with it any special significance for a 1930 general election. It does mark however, the whipping of election machinery into working shape, in accordance with an amendment to the Dominion Election Act passed at the last session of Parliament.

The old voters' list system has been "scrapped" For some years it was the practice to use provincial lists. The next general election, however, will witness a system under which enumerators and rural registrars will be required to make a house-to-house canvas on the issue of election writs, in the preparation of more up-to-date and authentic lists. This system was in use last Dominion Election.

Permanent returning officers in every constituency have been appointed. From 15,000 to 19,000 rural registrars have been chosen, while approximately 6,000 enumerators have been selected to complete the machinery. The new legislation provides for the holding of elections sixty days after the issue of writs.

OVER 800 ON TEACHERS PENSION LIST

There are now 833 teachers in Ontario on the pension list, 115 having been added during the year, according to the report of the teachers representatives on the pension commission. They are Principal R. A. Gray of Oakwood Collegiate and Inspector J. H. Putman of Ottawa.

The teachers paid \$691,000 into the fund last year, and the pensions paid were \$551,000.

There were 42 men and six women receiving pensions of over \$1,000 but the average pension paid to class A. females was \$562.

The fund is now firmly established and a total of \$619,731 was earned by interest on investment and deposits. The fund stands at \$2,037,783.

Every teacher is compelled to contribute to this fund, in most cases the payment is taken off the monthly cheque and forwarded to the department by the school secretary.

CLOTH SUSPECTS STILL ON BAIL

Charged with receiving approximately \$2,000 worth of clothing material stolen from John Monk-houser's tailoring shop, Stouffville, on April 12, John Ison, Ralph McPhaden, Solly Flader and Tom Garlock were brought up in county police court last week and granted a further remand until some time this week.

On a second charge of stealing the cloth, McPhaden, Flader and Ison were remanded for the same period, the theft charge against Garlock being withdrawn.

Harry Rosey counsel for McPhaden, offered to go with his client pleading guilty to both charges. However he wished a remand for Flader, Garlock's counsel, A. M. Gurofsky, desired an immediate trial, objecting to a third remand.

"We don't want to hear these cases piecemeal," decided the Crown. All charges were remanded without plea or election. Garlock is out on \$2,000 bail. No bail was extended McPhaden and Ison. Flader is held on \$5,000 bond.
