NEW PAVEMENT TO COST \$109,000

Stouffville's Share Is \$59,000-Toronto and York Road Commission Pay Balance

The municipal council has requested the Toronto and York Road Commission to call for tenders for the construction of a new roadway through this village from 9th to the 10th concessious, the same to be a paved road with concrete foundation, constructed with storm sewers gutters, catch basins, manholes and curbing. The total cost is estimated at \$109.000, and of this amount the corporation will pay \$59,000 and the remaining \$50,000.

Seventy-five per cent of the town's share will be a charge against all the property owners in the corporation while the other 25% will be assessed as a frontage tax against the properties along Main street. In the west end this amounts to \$1.75 per foot and in the east end the amount is \$1.13 per foot if paid immediately when the work is completed. Otherwise payments may be spread over 1.20 years, and at such high figures it is doubtful if but very few ratepayers could afford to put up the entire cost in one payment. spread over the twenty years the annual charge in the west end will be less than 14c. per foot, and in the east end less than 9c. per foot, basing the figures on the engineer's

The Toronto and York Commission are now calling for tenders when actual cost will be optainable, and then the council should have a chance to consider the facts at closer range. Two classes of roads will be tendered on, one with a tarvia or black top, Hoover. and the other with a cement top, which is less expensive than the black top road.

The tarvia or black top road is one of the finest types found anywhere, and with such elaborate drainage will not likely give any trouble for a long time in the way of heaving up every spring. If the road is ever completed it will give Stouffville one of the best Main streets to be found anywhere.

It is estimated that the tax rate will be increased six mills to meet this new expenditure.

Two weeks ago a public meeting almost unanimously requested the council to proceed with this new road, in the face of what looked like a three or four mill increase in taxes, which has since advanced to six, although the frontage rate is not estimated to be any higher than was quoted at the public meeting, in fact it is slightly decreased.


