The Stouffville Band furnished the music for the Richmond Hill Fair on Victoria Day. The crowd was very large, and this district was well represented there. Time was when the Uxbridge fair drew the crowd from this district, but by dint of liberal advertising the Richmond Hill Board have stemmed the tide, and turned it towards Yonge street. That eighteen inches of snow which fell in Saskatchewan last week, wasn't without effect here in Ontario. Although extremely warm last Friday, during the night a decided change came and the holiday broke raw and cold. The heavy frosts which followed the next few nights would have caused much damage but for the high winds which fortunately prevailed.

The municipal councils of either Stouffville, Whitechurch or Uxbridge Townships, would be justified in making application to the Ontario Government for the appointment of a game warden in this section. The game laws are being flagrantly broken in the matter of fishing, and in hunting out of season and on the Sabbath day. A farmer living not very far from Stouffville recently intimated to us that he was nervous in having any of his family go to the beautiful woods on his farm on Sunday, because there are so many young men roaming about there with fire arms.

Mrs. Norman Beal of Toronto, and daughter of Mr. Harvey J. Gould of Uxbridge, has announced her intention to run as a Conservative in the federal election, for the riding of west centre Toronto. In the days when Mrs. Beal was better known to the editor of this paper she was an accomplished elocutionist, and with this training will not be without platform ability. She is a member of an old Liberal family, and back in her school days it would have been nothing short of treason for a Gould to leave the Liberal ranks. However Mrs. Beal married into a Conservative family, while her mother is a sister to the late Col. Sam Sharpe, facts that would influence the family connection to see on both sides of the political fence. However, irrespective of which political group Mrs. Beal pledged allegiance, she would be an acquisition to that party.

The announcement in our last issue that the colored quintette from Cleveland which is to be here for the Mononite evangelistic meeting in July, will billet in Queen's Court recalls the fact that within the bricked walls which back in the balmy days of the old licensed system for hotels, dispensed "damnation," will now be housing a number of notables whose duty it is to "disperse" salvation. For the benefit of many readers who have not been in Stouffville for years, Queen's Court was once the old Queen's Hotel, a fine and widely known hostelry. It was remodelled by the late W. H. Todd into a modern double-dwelling house, and because of it happens to be vacant at this time, the church people have seized upon the opportunity of converting it into a billet for the purpose mentioned.

Markham and Stouffville High School baseball teams met in home and home games last week, when the Stouffville aggregation won the round by a score of one. The first game was staged at Markham on Thursday when the southern lads came out victorious with a one run lead. On the return visit on Friday Stouffville squeezed out a two goal lead, clinching the round as stated above.

Last Saturday being Victoria Day, most business places in town were closed, and there being no celebration of any kind the town was unusually quiet. The picture theatre proved quite an attraction in the evening, and accounted for a good many cars being parked on Main St. Because a picture house is such a drawing card, we notice that several municipal councils in Ont. towns have gone into the business lately on the argument that a play house is an asset to their community.

The yearly clean-up day and can collection which was postponed, owing to bad roads, will be made this Friday May 30th.

On account of the Ontario Medical Association Convention Dr. Woodrow will be in Stouffville Friday, May 30th instead of Thursday, May 29th.

Mr. J. Ora Reaman, book-keeper with the International Harvester Co. at Hamilton has been moved to the Toronto branch, where he will be in charge of his department.

Jubilee Chapter, O.E.S. Stouffville, will hold a garden party on Mr. Jas. Muston's lawn, on Friday evening, June 27th. The programme will be given by the Orpheus Male Quartette, Toronto.

Swift's Garage has secured an order for the manufacture of batteries for trucks belonging to the City Dairy fleet in Toronto. The plates used in the Swift batteries appealed to the big city concern which resulted in a large order running into several hundred dollars being received.

Mr. Fred Betz who recently sold his farm on the Wagg sideroad north of Stouffville, moved off the place last week, and is living in the Morris house on the 9th concession of Whitechurch, near the old railway tracks. He is taking on summer work at carpentering, etc.

The proprietor of the Auditorium Theatre desires to inform the public that the license for the ensuing year has been renewed. This no doubt will offset the rumor-abroad to the effect that the Auditorium was condemned. No such word was used in the report by the department, but owing to more drastic regulations they will not allow the installation of sound equipment.

Richard Madill of Stouffville who has been trucking live stock in this district for some time, has purchased the milk route from Frank Timbers which extends into Whitechurch Township on the 8th and 9th concessions. Mr. Timbers established this route a couple of years ago over a territory which heretofore did not ship milk to the Toronto dairies.

In order to conform with action taken by the banks in adjacent towns and to establish uniform hours to the public throughout the district the banks in Stouffville wish to announce that commencing Monday June 16th, 1930 banking hours will be as follows: 9.30 a.m. to 3.00 p.m. except Saturdays when the hours will be from 9.30 a.m. to 12.00 o'clock noon.

Since the announcement in the press on the details for a paved road through Stouffville, we have been waiting to hear from the objectors to the scheme sponsored by the civic council, and backed up by a public meeting which almost unanimously requested the council to proceed with the new road. Many a move on the part of our councils in the past which didn't involve an expenditure of more than a fraction of a mill, has caused more flurry and protest than the present big undertaking which is calculated to increase the tax rate by six mills. There seems to be an almost unanimous general acceptance of the idea, and whether people like the inevitable increase in taxes, they are disposed to pay rather than turn against the new road proposition. The Toronto and York Road Commission are now calling for tenders for the work which is being done concurrent with the necessary advertising to permit the local council to proceed with their part of the deal.

- The Council of the Corporation of the Village of Stouffville intends to construct a local improvement a pavement with the necessary storm sewers and curbs and gutters from road allowance between Concessions Eight and Nine, Township of Whitechurch, to road allowance between concessions Nine and Ten, Township of Whitechurch and intends to specially assess a part of the cost upon the land abutting directly on the work.
- The estimated cost of the work, the amounts to be paid by the Corporation and the estimated cost per foot frontage are as follows:

- A petition to the said council will not avail to prevent its construction, but a petition against the work or the manner in which it has been undertaken may be made pursuant to section 8 of The Local Improvement Act, to the Railway and Municipal Board, by a majority of the owners representing at least one-half of the value of the lots which are to be specially assessed therefor.
- A by-law for undertaking the work will be considered by the council at a meeting thereof to be held on the 20th day of June 1930, or at a regular or special meeting thereof to be held thereafter.
