NOTES AND COMMENTS

Charitable criticism is what is
needed these days.There are 2,900 men and women
enumerators at work in Toronto
completing the voters' list for the
forthcoming election, on July 28th.
Half this army is Liberal and half
Conservative, and they travel in
pairs, one from either side. They get
eight cents each per name, the rate
paid all enumerators from coast to
coast. Only in cities do they travel in
pairs, for in township towns, and
villages one enumerator will do a
polling division.At a largely-attended meeting of
the U.F.O. in Durham on Saturday,
Miss Agnes McPhail, M.P., for South
east Grey was unanimously re-
nominated for the fourth time to be
the standard bearer in the pending
general election. Dr. Campbell, a
Markdale dentist, was nominated
last summer as the Conservative
candidate but has not been active in
the riding since his nomination. He
was defeated in the general election of
1925 by Miss McPhail by a
majority of 1407 and the only lady
member of the House of Commons
has increased her prestige in the
riding in the past five years. It is a
waste of time and energy for a party
candidate to try to defeat Miss
McPhail and it would be a gracious
act on the part of both the historic
parties of Canada to allow Miss
McPhail to be returned by acclama-
tion. She votes for one party as
often as for the other and independ-
ent members exercise a restraining
influence on governments. —Chesley
Enterprise.An Ontario weekly newspaper
recently stated that there are 235
seats in the House of Commons
and without verifying the statement
several of our exchanges published
the erroneous figures. The figures
quoted by these newspapers were
correct for the House of Commons
from 1914 till 1924 but by the
Redistribution Act of 1924 the
number of seats was increased to
245, made up as follows: Ontario
82, Quebec 65, Saskatchewan 21,
Manitoba 17, Alberta 16, British
Columbia 14, Nova Scotia 14, New
Brunswick 11, Prince Edward Island
4, Yukon 1. The Conservative party
now holds 91 of the 245 seats and
would need to capture 32 seats in
the next general election to have a
bare majority.

NATIVE OF GOODWOOD DIES IN THE WEST

Old friends in this section will be
sorry to learn that Mr. Alvin Jones,
of Asquith, Sask., is dead, he having
passed away on June 6th from heart
trouble. He was a son of the late
Mr. and Mrs. George Jones of Good-
wood, and was only 35 years of age.For five years the late Mr. Jones
had been troubled with a weak heart.
Eleven years ago his young wife
passed away, leaving two small
children, son and daughter, who
survive the father along with three
sisters and one brother. They are
Mrs. George Redshaw of Claremont,
Mrs. Russell Downswell of Goodwood,
Mrs. Roy Grasby of Asquith, and
William Jones of Uxbridge.The funeral took place on Monday
of this week, the remains being laid
to rest at Asquith, beside those of
his wife.

TOOK LIFE IN PICKERING TOWNSHIP.

On Thursday evening a phone
message was received by Constable
Oliver Crummer from a resident of
the lake shore south of Stork Bros.,
informing him that there had been a
fine Buick car parked near the
sidewalk, which might be a stolen
car, and asking him to investigate.
Mr. Clark and Mr. Crummer went
down, and after seeing the car made
further investigation when they dis-
covered a woman's coat, hat and
glasses. Returning to the village
they at once communicated with the
detective department in Toronto,
giving the number of the car and
other details. The sergeant re-
plied that the car was not stolen,
but belonged to A.R. Poole, of 99
Clifton Rd., Toronto, and that his
wife had disappeared with the car.
Shortly after Mr. Poole phoned and
on hearing the description of the
articles found, knew at once that
they belonged to his wife and he
feared that she had done away with
herself. With several friends he at
once came down to Pickering. On
account of the darkness they could
not carry on a search and returned
to the city. In the morning they
again came down, when they found
the body washed up to the shore. Her
face was badly scratched on account
of the gravelly bottom. Her clothing
was also badly torn from the same
cause. Constable Crummer and
Provincial Officer, Mitchell, of
Oshawa, investigated the incident
thoroughly, but decided that it was
a pure case of suicide. The unfortu-
nate woman, who was in good
circumstances, was dependent on
account of ill health. Some time ago
she underwent a serious operation
from which she never fully recovered
and the evidently preyed upon her
mind. Coroner Dr. Cartwright, be-
ing notified of the death and having
investigated, decided that an inquest
was not necessary.

WHITCHURCH TP. COUNCIL

Whitchurch Township Council met
on Saturday to transact general
business. Much of the session was
given over to the work of Court of
Revision reported elsewhere in this
issue.The reeve and Councillor Rae
were given authority to do gravell-
ing on the 9th con. to repair the
rough spots.It was decided to purchase 1000
feet of bridge timber from Elmer
Clark, to be delivered to the town-
ship hall property for use in the
Municipality.A motion introduced by Messrs.
Rae and Williams that council
decide to build a cement culvert be-
tween lots 25-26, con 2, and that
the clerk call for tenders, was de-
feated. It was argued that there was
plenty of good timber in the bridge
with which to rebuild the structure
so that it might render further
service for a time at least.Accounts were passed in favor of
the Municipal World for supplies
amounting to \$12.45; Banner Press,
advertising \$2.20; J. A. Clark,
valuing sheep three times, and
hydro poles \$10.00; H. M. Jake-

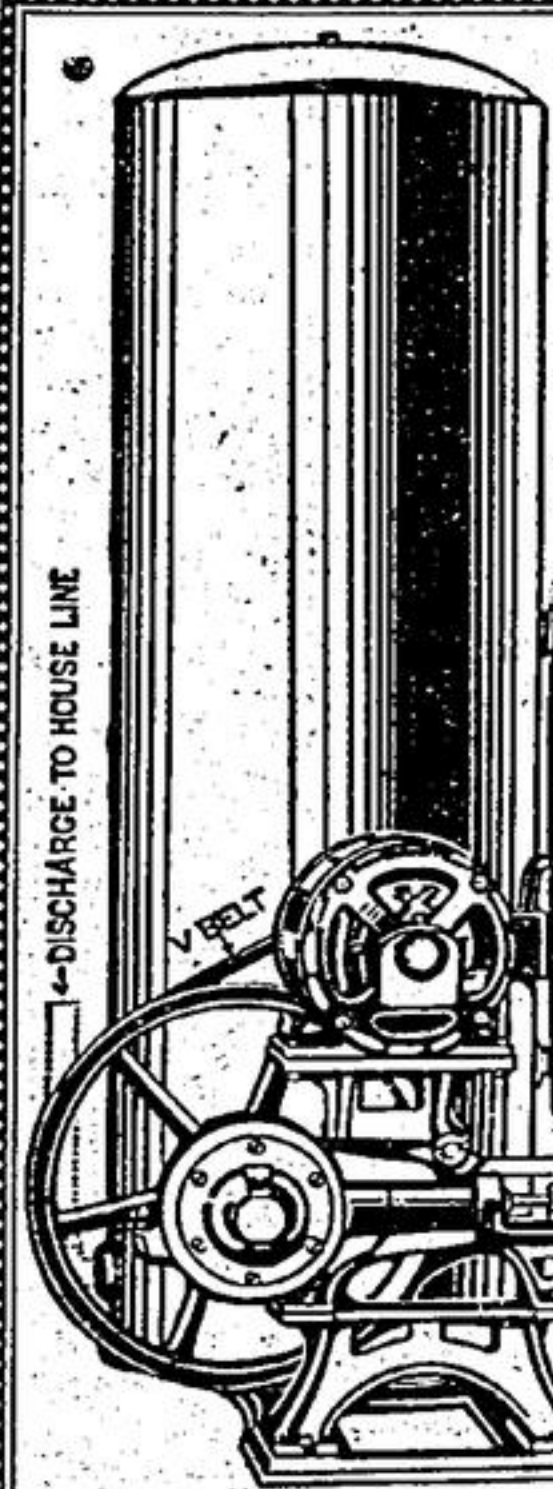
