The Pledge

From the moment the United States Congress first began its revision of the tariff, the Mackenzie King Government has been fully alive to the situation, and has made it clear both in Parliament and throughout the country that at the proper time it would take such measures in reply to the American tariff as would effectively safeguard the interests of Canada.

On June 19th, 1929, Hon. Ernest Lapointe made this declaration: 'We will continue to shape our financial policies on a national basis, in the interests of all sections in Canada. We will legislate not for one class but all classes and groups of the Canadian people.'

Conservative speakers have tried in vain to minimize the effect of the Budget of 1930 on American imports to this country.

In the Budget debate of the session of 1929, the Prime Minister (Mackenzie King) spoke as follows:

"But I repeat—and I do not think this can be made too clear—that so far as the United States tariff is concerned, that is a matter which the Government of that country must settle for itself in accordance with its own interest; and the United States will be the first to recognize, if in any action they take our trade is adversely affected, that it is our duty and our right, and should be and will be our policy to see to it that we make such arrangements with respect to our tariff as will further our interests in our own way."

The Performances

On May 1st, 1930, the Hon. Chas. Dunning delivered his Budget speech in the House of Commons and announced the most far-reaching revision of the Canadian tariff which has been made in many years.

Conservative speakers have tried in vain to minimize the effect of the Budget of 1930 on American imports to this country.

Here is a statement from the official report of the Commercial Attache of the United States Legation in Ottawa: "The budget speech to the Canadian Parliament on May 1st, 1930, included tariff proposals by the Minister of Finance which represents the most extensive revision of the tariff since 1907. American trade aggregating between \$175,000,000 and \$225,000,000 is affected, adversely in most instances."

MARKHAM TP. COUNCIL.

The regular monthly meeting of the Markham Township Council was held on Monday afternoon. Deputy Reeve R. L. Stiver presided in the absence of Reeve Gohn who was attending a conference re the Metropolitan Radial Purchase. The agreement for the operation of the line by the T. T. C. was passed by council, and the Reeve and clerk authorized to sign the same.

Considerable discussion arose over the road on the Sixth and some favored going the whole way with \$12,000 outlay and others felt, in-

cluding the acting reeve, that it was not wise nor right to sink so much money "in order to make a few rods of good road that could be reached only by travel over miles of much poorer roads. Mr. Padget spoke for permanent work on the Sixth but came round to the reeve's idea if the work could be well patched for \$6000. Finally all jumped into a car to give the Sixth the "once-over, before deciding.
