### Untimely Death of Mrs. Albert Clark Who Leaves Five Children

A particularly sad death occurred at the Victoria Hospital in Toronto, on Friday of last week when Mrs. Albert Clark of Whitechurch Township passed away following an operation performed for appendicitis. She was only 41 years of age and leaves five children.

On Tuesday of the week previous to her death she was stricken with appendicitis, and was taken to the hospital some days later, when the appendix was removed successfully. Her sudden collapse came as a complete surprise when she was reported to be recovering.

A daughter of the late Ira Pryne, Myrtle was loved by a large circle of friends. Deceased was born on the farm now occupied by Oliver Beach, north of Lake Musselman. She was married 17 years ago to Albert Clark, and the couple lived at lot 25, con. 9, since that time. Besides the sorrowing husband, Mrs. Clark is survived by one sister, Mrs. John Wagg of Manitowish Island, and one brother, Charles Pryne of Toronto. Also her aged mother of Ballantyne. The eldest of the family of five children is a daughter aged 17 years, while the youngest child is 7 years.

On Sunday afternoon the funeral took place to Churchill cemetery, while service was held in the church there conducted by Rev. E. Norton. A large number of sympathizing friends attended the sad service at the late home, and at the church and graveside.

## NATIVE CITIZEN LAID TO REST

### A. S. Leaney Succumbs to Illness of One Year

The funeral of the late Archibald Samuel Leaney who died at his residence in Stouffville on August 30th, 1930, in his 75th year, was held from Christ Church, (Anglican) on Monday of this week. Interment took place at Stouffville cemetery. The little old church which the late William Leaney, father of the deceased, helped to establish almost a century ago, was filled with friends and relatives. The funeral service was conducted by the rector, Rev. R. Robbins, assisted by a former rector Rev. T. Curless of Toronto. The pall bearers were Messrs. John E. Urquhart, Chas. Urquhart, F. W. Silvester, F. L. Button, E. A. Button and Dr. H. B. Freel.

Mr. Leaney was the son of a pioneer Irish merchant of Stouffville, who succeeded his father in the business which was carried on in the same site where it was established, the premises now being partly occupied by the public library. It was on these same premises that the late Archie Leaney was born. He was educated at Uxbridge High School and Toronto Business College. He was active in municipal and church affairs, having served for some years on the village council and as a school trustee. He had also been a warden of Christ Church, and spent his whole life on the homestead where he died. In politics he was a staunch Conservative, and followed the doings of parliament with keen interest. Being a great reader he was well informed on public matters.

Twice married, his first wife was Mary Vonbuseck and to them one child survives, being Mrs. William Jamieson of Hamilton. His second wife was Fannie Silvester who also survives him. Three sisters predeceased him, being Mrs. John Urquhart, Mrs. (Dr.) Rowan, and Mrs. Tranmer.

In the passing of Mr. Leaney the last of a family name has passed away that was prominently connected with the early history of Stouffville, for from the time of incorporation his father was one of the history makers of the village, being a member of the first council ever elected after incorporation. In the death of our townsman last week it is as though a link in the chain had been severed which connected the early pioneer days with those of the present.

## FORMER PASTOR MEETS DEATH WHILE BATHING

### Rev. A. G. Warden and Olive Mitchell Victims in a Strange Tragedy—Death not Due to Drowning

A double tragedy which occurred at the bathing beach at Port Burwell on Thursday 6th last week when Rev. A. G. Warden, former Menonite pastor of Stouffville and Miss Olive Mitchell both lost their lives in a mysterious way, came as a terrible shock to the many friends of the Warden family.

Mr. Warden with Olive Mitchell and his two young daughters Elvira and Hazel were bathing prior to the evening gathering of the 17th annual tent meeting of the Bible Conference. It was just about six o'clock, and the two Warden girls left the water to dress and get supper ready. While still in the dressing room the Mitchell girl was heard to scream and the two girls rushed out to see what was up. Realizing that the girl in the water was in danger of drowning, and unable to see their father they rushed to a nearby camper for help.

Their screams attracted Mr. and Mrs. H. Pearce who rushed out their boat, and recovered the body of the girl floating on the surface, with life extinct. Efforts to find the body of Mr. Warden were unsuccessful until two hours later when it floated to shore a short distance from the camp.

As no one witnessed the actual tragedy, just how the two people lost their lives will always remain a mystery. It is believed, however, that they did not drown, but that the girl saw Mr. Warden in difficulties, screamed and fainted, her heart giving out right then. Mr. Warden had been swimming about and it is thought his heart suddenly gave out so that he went under in view of the girl. This supposition is borne out by the fact that his heart was not strong, and by the further evidence that no water was found in the lungs of either victim.

Miss Mitchell went to Port Burwell to visit the Warden family, and could only swim a short distance while the preacher was a fairly strong swimmer.

Rev. A. G. Warden was pastor of the Menonite church at Aylmer where he was most successful in the work and was president of the Ministerial Association of the town. He was 45 years of age. Oliver Mitchell who went over from Aylmer was only 16 years of age and a loveable girl. The two funerals were held from Aylmer.

Rev. S. Goudie of Stouffville was summoned on the night of the tragedy and rushed to the scene to assist the bereaved wife and children in their trouble. He conducted the funeral service which was participated in by all the ministers of Aylmer, while the body was taken to Lions' Head for burial.

A strange co-incidence in connection with the grief which has overcome Mrs. Warden is the fact that when she was a small girl, her father, grand-father and an uncle were all drowned in Michigan while on a fishing trip.

### Three Whitechurch Farmers Suffer Loss

### AURORA TO BUILD NEW RINK

Out of nine tenders received from leading construction firms in York County, W. G. Green & Co., of Aurora, with a bid of \$14,000, was awarded the contract to build the new Aurora sports arena, by Aurora Council last Friday.

The proposed new arena will be of steel construction. It will be 193 feet long and 101 feet wide, having an ice surface of 175 by 75. The building will be constructed in the shape of a horseshoe, with the entrance at the large end. Just inside the entrance there will be a refreshment stand and on each side of the entrance at the same end will be two players' dressing rooms and women's and men's rest rooms. There will also be a room set aside for the installation of an artificial ice plant.

The accepted tender is far below what council expected to pay. However, Green, in the deal, obtains the old building for his own use. He may use some of the lumber in the new building.

The new arena will be situated on Yonge street, just north of the waterworks. At the present time there is a mortgage to be discharged on the lot. As soon as this mortgage is wiped off W. G. Green will start work.
