AID IS ASKED TO KEEP FARM HOME TOGETHER

Suggests Few Boarders Would Enable Her to Overcome Difficulty

(Toronto Daily Star)
Stouffville, Oct. 8.—On a peaceful-looking little homestead a few miles northeast of Stouffville a mother's prayerful urge to keep her household intact is struggling at odds with adverse economic and natural forces.

"We have had hard times," the young, clean-cut wife told a Star reporter when he went to interview her in answer to a letter for aid.

"Work is poor, the crops have gone down, and we just lost a pair of horses," she said. "I have a daughter, sixteen. She's a big girl and she wants to go out and get a job. But you never can tell where a young girl will go, or what will happen to her, and I want to keep her at home."

The reporter surveyed the shining linoleum of the kitchen floor, the spotless cleanliness of the oilcloth on the sturdy table, and the black lustre of the wood stove.

In came the husband, tall, lean with even features: "Blows like rain," he said by way of greeting. He sat down and listened while his wife explained that she didn't like to ask assistance, but that if some didn't arrive soon, they would have to give up their 40-acre farm.

Boarders Would Help
"We're used to taking in boarders," the wife continued. "I've got two spare rooms. And I like to care for old women. My grandmother was an invalid. I used to have to help her up and downstairs, and watch her all the time, but I liked it."

"We have some neighbors who are quick to ridicule," said the woman, blushing. "I don't want to put my name in the papers if I can help it. It would solve our difficulty though if we could get a couple of regular boarders, or an invalid. It doesn't cost us much to live here."

Aura of Cleanliness
Outside the reporter took occasion to admire the high green hedge which runs into an arched gateway in front of the farm house. A few chinchilla rabbits frolicked about the door. Two cows browsed in a nearby field. Over the whole place hung an aura of cleanliness and cheer, clouded only by adverse circumstances.

"We're good religious people," said the husband as the reporter left. "Go to church every Sunday, and the children go to Sunday school. I don't drink and I don't use tobacco."

Fall Fairs Flourish

Despite depressed economic conditions and a season marked chiefly by prolonged drought, the community fall fairs throughout Ontario generally report unprecedented attendance and splendid showings of agricultural produce. As an individual instance the annual fair in the village of Caledonia, in Haldimand County, drew a patronage of 10,000 people, a record for all time. From almost every fair similar reports have been received, indicating that whatever the conditions, the rural residents of Ontario are taking an even keener interest and pride in their own industry than ever before.

Royal Directors Optimistic

The Royal Winter Fair directors are optimistic about agricultural conditions in Canada for the coming fall and winter. In a message to leading breeders and producers who as exhibitors at the Royal do much by their unswerving example to establish steady confidence in Canadian agriculture, the management points out that "despite dry weather conditions in several places, Canadian feeding stuffs are in more than average volume. The hay crops everywhere are considered satisfactory and in some parts exceptionally good."

Fighting White Grub

As the one effective measure at this season of the year, which will assist in control and eradication of a white grub outbreak of serious proportions in Eastern Ontario, fall plowing and frequent discing from now to freeze-up are advised. Plowing helps to break up the grub cells; exposes them to attacks by natural enemies such as the crow, star-nosed mole and skunk; retards the grub's digging down for winter and exposes the grub cells to frost, which kills them effectively. The outbreak started apparently in the eastern townships in 1927, moved across the St. Lawrence to Eastern Ontario by flight of the June beetle, parents of the white grub in 1928, and this year across the Ottawa eastward infesting a large area in Quebec.

Wanted—5000 Barrels of Apples
Ontario apple-growers are advised in a cablegram from Premier Ferguson to Hon. T. L. Kennedy, Minister of Agriculture, that they can sell 5000 barrels to European buyers immediately through Andrew Fulton, who represents the Ontario fruit growers in England if the standard of shipment is assured. Through Mr. Fulton's efforts to improve the grading and packing, buyers in the Old Country are looking with greater favor upon Ontario apples and prices ranging up to \$7.00 a barrel have been secured on the British market this year.

Rainy River Famous For Lamb Production
There is possibly no section of Ontario that has a higher percentage of good sheep and a lower percentage of poor sheep than has the District of Rainy River. Sheep raising there has increased greatly during the past five or six years. Through the efforts of the Department, purebred sires have been introduced over this period of time and this, coupled with educational extension work, has made it possible for the sheep breeders in Rainy River District to market a very high percentage of choice lambs.


