Proper Ration Needed

A good mash is important if the hens are to lay, and it should be before the birds all the time. If any one of the necessary elements required for the making of eggs is absent, production is impaired. Pullets require a little different mash than the old hens and it is a mistake to house them together and have them feed from the same hopper. Home-grown feeds with the addition of some purchased concentrates may be mixed, or a commercial mash may be purchased that will supply the necessary ingredients to the bird.
