### Fight on Unsightly Posters in Paris Interests Britain

In view of the outcry in England against the spoiling of the countryside as well as cities and villages by unsightly advertising, steps which are being taken in Paris to guard against this menace are of interest, writes a correspondent of "The London Daily Telegraph."

When a shop falls vacant or building operations are undertaken, boards covered with posters spring up like mushrooms in front of the unoccupied building or site. Many beautiful corners of the capital have been rendered ugly in this way. The

understanding is that such posters shall be taken away within a few months. But many hoardings have been in position for a long time and threaten to become permanent features of the streets.

A case in point which will occur to any recent visitor is the structure raised round the site of old houses demolished some time ago in order that the famous Rue du Bac might be widened. Lovers of old Paris who might readily admit that the street needed widening were certainly distressed at the occasion which it furnished for a blaze of poster publicity.

But the Prefect of the Seine In-

tends to take action. Every hoarding which has been in position for more than two months is to go and permission for new ones will not be granted. The Prefect's difficulty is that he has no power to deal with structures of the kind that do not project beyond the line of frontage.
