Editor, The Tribune: As a Whitechurch taxpayer who has been instrumental in bringing other taxpayers to the township, I may comment in your columns on a situation which can at best be described as peculiar.

Recently the Whitechurch council passed two by-laws, one prohibiting miniature golf on Sunday, the other forbidding bathes to undress in their automobiles upon the public highway, or to appear there clad only in bathing suits.

The first of these by-laws has been enforced rigidly. But the second is being utterly ignored, as any member of our council can see who chooses to motor on the roads adjacent to Musselman's or Wilcox Lakes.

Whatever it is to be permitted on Sunday, surely we should encourage that variety which least outrages the sense of modesty and righteousness which permeates our excellent township.

Council held a special meeting in the hall at Unionville on Monday evening, June 8th, for the purpose of letting the contracts for four concrete culverts.

On the Almira sideroad, west of Spoffords corner, on the third concession at lot 14, and between concessions 3 & 4 at lot 20 respectively.
