NOTES AND COMMENTS

God has given us tongues that we may say something pleasant to our fellow men.—Helen.

One reason why people strenuously object to increased taxation is that so much money is wasted by our governments that it arouses a resentful feeling. The three-cent postage for instance is a heavy burden to be placed on the people; yet up in the town of Walkerton the caretaker of the post office, 65 years of age is being superannuated and given a life pension of \$900 per year. This new pensioner drew \$1200 per year since 1916 as caretaker, and now draws most of his old salary. A new caretaker is taken on at \$1200. Just why this position held for only a few years calls for a pension is something not explained.

People who have families to feed and who must count the cost of everything they buy are foolish if they do not make a full use of eggs and butter these days. Word comes from Toronto, however, that people are not buying as many eggs as when they were double or treble the price. An egg, so long as it is fresh, is just as good at a cent as one at five cents. People who are not thrifty enough to take advantage of the present low prices are not good managers. Butter, milk and eggs, the three most valuable foods obtainable, are now procurable at lower prices than for years.

The report that Newfoundland is trying to sell Labrador has been denied. There is, however, considerable speculation going on in Canada and not a few are of the opinion that it would be good business for Canada to acquire this strip of her main coast line with its hinterland. The reason, no doubt, for this view is that Labrador is rich in minerals and would be an adjunct to Canada in that respect. It is thought that there will be rich iron deposits, as well as lead, zinc, copper, cobalt, silver and gold. The chief trouble is that mining development would be a slow and laborious business in that country, owing to transportation difficulties, and for that reason there might be difficult.

On the other hand, because of the known richness of the country the price that Newfoundland would want might be considerably higher than the Dominion would feel like paying, particularly at this time. It should not be allowed to go to any other country, however, for it is really part of Canada, even if the Privy Council did award it to Newfoundland.

ONTARIO COUNTY'S FOREST

(Whitby Chronicle)
 A number of years ago, when Ontario County went into the business of growing trees to supply future generations with timber, establishing a miniature forest in Uxbridge Township, there were those, not in the County Council, however, who viewed the experiment with considerable doubt as to its success. They felt that the county was investing money from which adequate returns would never be realized.
 Today, according to a report presented to the County Council last week, there are \$23 acres planted, and only ten per cent of the trees planted have died. This year \$75,000 more trees will be set out, and there now only remains 150 of the

973 acres purchased to be planted. The trees are growing rapidly on land unsuitable for farming. Thirty years hence men will be going in with axes to cut down timber provided through the foresight of men who believed that they did not live for themselves alone but owed something to posterity.
 The forest, now successfully growing, is one of the best investments the county ever made. And remember, the county will gain financially from it when the forest reaches maturity.

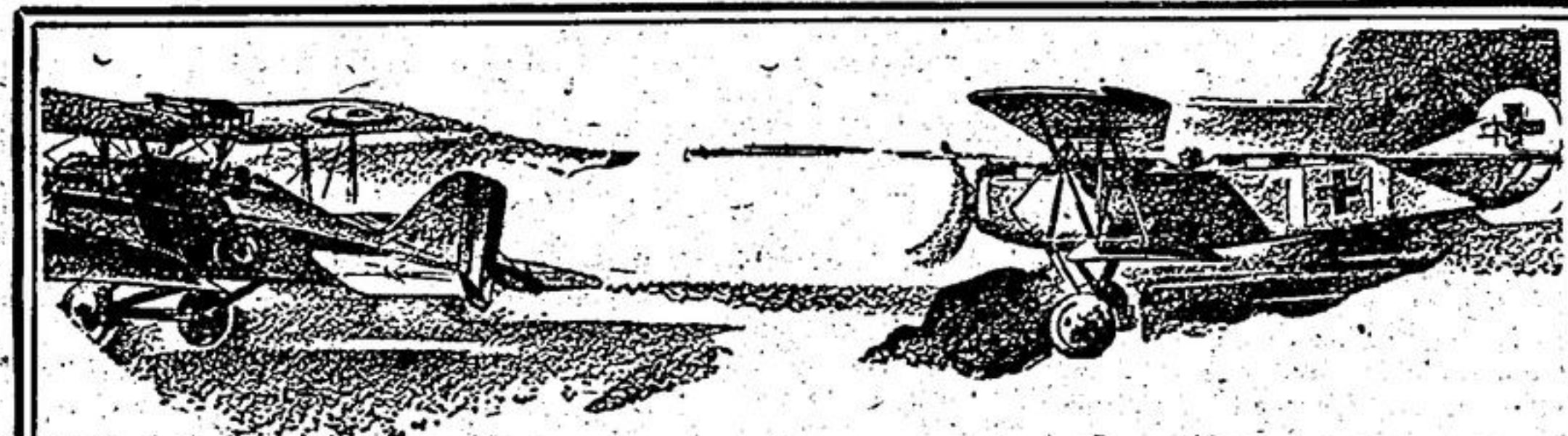
School Notes

Reports
 It is the custom in some schools to report the standing of the pupils, monthly in the local press. It may be of public interest in a town, but what interest has the general public in the report of a rural school? Of course, it is a pleasant thing for the parents and friends of clever children to see the names bearing the high marks. The others must be content with middle or low places in the list. If we could only measure and report the actual amount of honest effort expended on lessons it would be more to the point. The clever pupils usually get the patting on the back. The dull plodder receives little attention. Yet in many cases, the plodder turns out to be the more desirable citizen.
 In a number of schools monthly report cards are sent home to the parents. One entry on the card shows the pupils rank in the class. It is next to impossible to estimate the real standing in this regard. Besides a difference in the intelligence of pupils, there is often irregular attendance to consider. Then there is a place to report the conduct of the child. Why shouldn't parents report to teachers the child's home conduct? It is usual that a child who behaves well at home finds it easy to do so at school. Cleverness is also a factor in conduct. Pupils are often clever enough to "put it over" and "get away" with mischievous conduct, and then get reported E. or G. Pedagogue.

 Officers elected are:—Morgan Baker, president; H. Naughton, secretary and T. Trench, treasurer.

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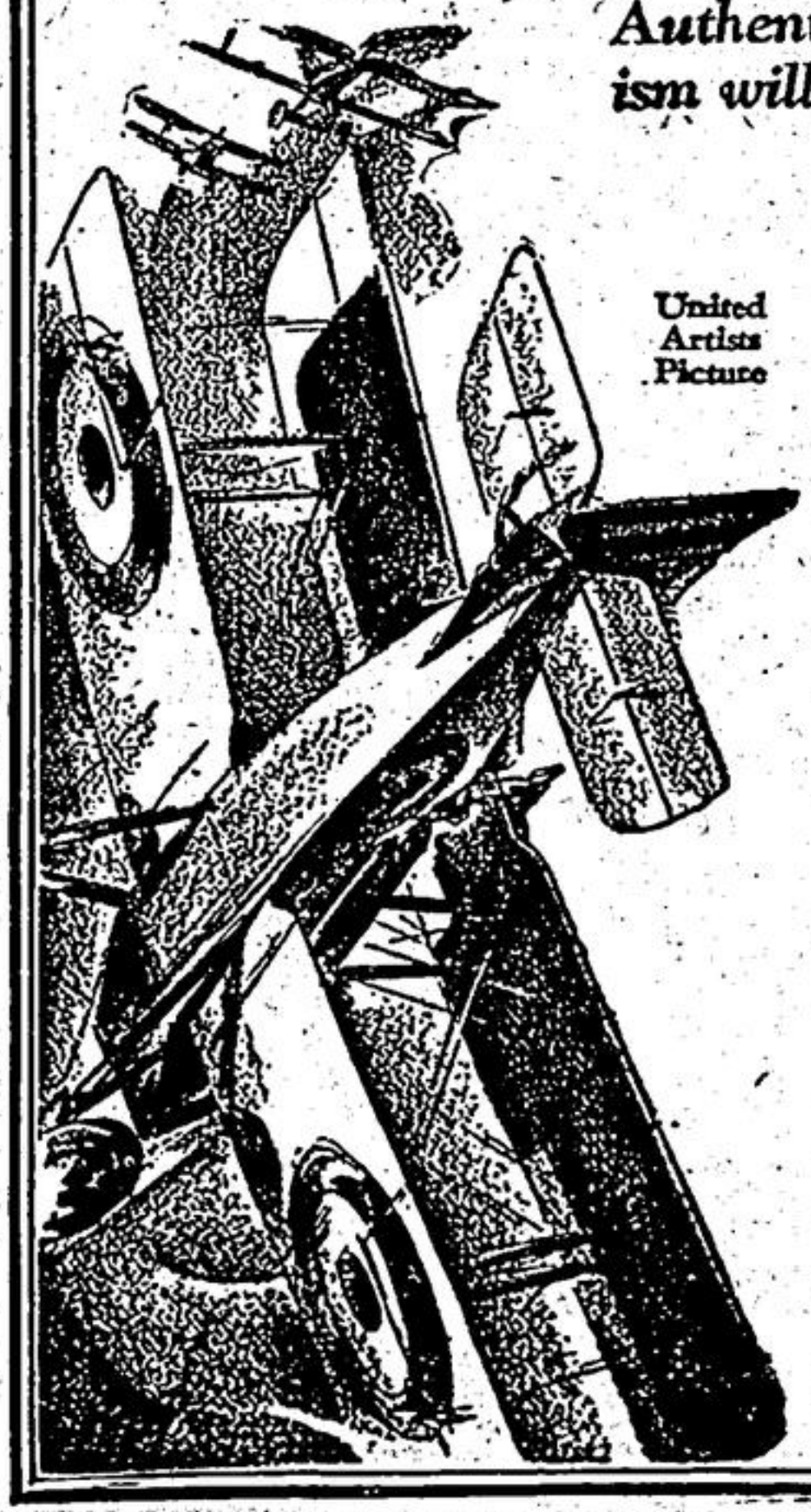
