### CONTESTANTS MUST OBEY REGULATIONS

Plowing Match Secretaries Sometimes Become Involved in Court Actions

A couple of years ago A. V. Nolan, the secretary of the North York Plowmen's Association was threatened with a law suit or action for damages of some sort by a prize winner who failed to call for his prize until a year had lapsed, and the firm donating the prize then repudiated the gift. One of the regulations on the printed prize list is that all prizes shall be called for before the end of the year in which the match is held. This is the thing that prevented case going to court. If the prize winner sought court action in the face of the regulation he probably would have met the same fate as reported from South Bruce where regulations were not complied with.

The South Bruce Plowmen's Association through their Secretary, Alex. McKague, refused to pay a prize awarded at the annual match staged at Salem last October to a contestant named Collins of Mitchell on the grounds that he was ineligible to compete in the class he entered.

Collins through his solicitor, Mr. Campbell Grant, sued McKague in the division court for the amount of the two prizes of \$13 each, and the hearing took place at Teeswater on Tuesday afternoon.

Mr. Roy Robertson, as counsel for the defendant, objected to McKague being tried, as he was merely acting as Secretary for the organization. With this view Judge Owens coincided, and permitted the plaintiff Collins to include the Association as defendants.

Mr. Robertson pointed out by quoting the conditions of the competition in Class 4 in which Collins was a contestant that only plowmen who had never won a first prize at any previous match would be eligible to compete, and the defence counsel proceeded to show where the plaintiff had won 1st money elsewhere and was therefore not conforming to the provisions of Association's rules. Upon learning this the Judge in a firm tone stated in substance that it was beyond his comprehension why any one who could read would want to compete, say nothing of attempting to seek redress through the medium of the courts without the semblance of a foundation to build a case upon.

His Honour promptly dismissed the action, and levied all the costs upon the plaintiff.
