They are moving their stock this week some 70 miles to the east to get water, and are paying 75c per tank water at Yellowgrass. Another farmer who came from Ontario has packed up and moved back to his town of Walkerton after hooting his ten head of horses which were suffering from thirst.

LEADS TO WASTE

(The Financial Post) Mr. King made one of the most constructive comments of whole career when he said the other day in relation to governmental expenditures: "I would be much more ready to forgive honorable gentlemen opposite for not carrying out a few of their pledges, than I would be to commend them for endeavoring to do so under present conditions." During the last election campaign Mr. Bennett went around the country promising various new projects and new laws that The Financial Post at the time figured would involve the country, if they were carried out, in total expenditures of \$400,000,000. Mr. Bennett is not trying to carry out all his promises now, but he is going further in that respect than the financial condition of the country will

Mr. King's remark came in the course of a very scholarly, and at the same time practical address, in which he opposed the grown practice of making grants from the Federal treasury to the various provinces, in addition to the annual subsides provided by the state. Mr. King estimates that during the past ten years grants have been made by the Federal Government to the provinces, concerning which there can be no complaints since they are part of the contract of Confederation, totalled \$146,912,652.

The additional Federal grants during the period of roughly the last ten years include payments for the advancement of agricultural instruction; and aid to employment offices; grants for highway construction; grants for the promotion of technical education; grants for the combating of venereal disease; unemployment relief; old age pensions. 
