The Farmers Information

(From Dept. of Agriculture)
New Weeds Appear
 The three weeds that stand out as
 the most troublesome are sow thistle,
 couch grass and Canada thistle,
 though each district has its own
 particular pest. Sow thistle is
 particularly bad in Ontario and the
 Prairie Provinces, where rich soil
 and moisture are favorable to its
 growth. Inspectors in Ontario are
 receiving reports on the prevalence
 of milkweed which may have to be
 added to the noxious list. Another
 that is attracting attention is ele-
 campane, a coarse growing plant
 with rather attractive flowers which
 is seen on the roadsides and along
 fence rows.

Close Attention Needed
 Close attention should be given
 the calving and farrowing pens.
 Failure to render necessary assist-
 ance at the right time has resulted
 in loss and every calf and pig that
 dies makes it just that much more
 difficult for those that live to make
 a profit on the year's operation. The
 sooner young pigs get out in the
 sun the less danger of loss at three
 to five weeks of age. Cod liver oil
 may be fed to pigs as well as
 chickens to ward off trouble.

Canadian Cattle to Britain
 Canadian cattle evidently are find-
 ing a good market in Great Britain.
 While the number exported so far
 this year has been comparatively
 small, enough cattle have been ship-
 ped to prove that under present cir-
 cumstances this affords a good outlet
 for Canadian fat cattle and
 stockers. Arrangements are virtually
 complete whereby some 15,000 head
 will be shipped to England by the
 first of August at the ocean rate of
 \$15 per head.

Going After Markets
 The Department is evolving plans
 for opening a new market for honey,
 of which a surplus of about eight
 million pounds is now recorded in
 the province. Trade in Western
 Canada is also being given atten-
 tion and the Ontario Fruit Growers'
 Association is sending a representa-
 tive to Winnipeg. Learnington
 tomato growers are also sending a
 representative there to study
 marketing conditions. In a recent
 conference with fruit and vegetable
 growers in the Kingsville-Leamington
 area, Honorable Thomas L.
 Kennedy pointed out specific cases
 where losses had been sustained be-
 cause proper containers had not
 been used in sending fruit and
 vegetables West. Proper packing
 is also important, he emphasized,
 and the appearance of the packed
 product plays an important part
 in sales. He referred to products

Onion Acreage Increases
 An increase of 28 per cent. in the
 sown acreage of onions this year as
 compared with last year is reported
 by officials of the Ontario onion
 pool. The total for the present sea-
 son is 2,400 acres of all kinds of
 onions.

Promising Crops
 Conditions throughout Ontario
 are very promising. From present
 indications it appears that haying
 will start somewhat earlier than the
 average year and the yield, espe-
 cially new seedling, will be very
 heavy. Fall wheat and spring grains
 are making wonderful growth. The
 price of cheese has strengthened in
 the last week or two, but many fac-
 tories report a small make, due to
 milk products finding their way in-
 to other dairy products.

Mortality in Young Pigs
 A high mortality in hogs on farms
 in Simcoe County is reported by
 Stewart L. Page, agricultural repre-
 sentative. Young pigs have been dy-
 ing when only a few days old and
 in many cases have been still-born.
 The mortality has been higher in
 young pigs than in more mature ani-
 mals. Mr. Page states that it is due
 in part to the dry season experi-
 enced last year and to the fact that
 poorly balanced rations are being
 fed in many hog areas. Home-grown
 rations are often deficient in pro-
 tein and mineral matter and for
 this reason many hog producers
 find it advisable to feed some
 mineral mixture as recommended in
 charts supplied by the department,
 which are available at your local
 representative's office. A mixture of
 50 pounds of bone flour and 30
 pounds of slake lime or pulverized
 limestone, with ten pounds of com-
 mon salt, 5 lbs. of iron sulphate and
 3 ounces of potassium iodide is re-
 commended to be fed in addition to
 home-grown feeds as a measure
 directed towards lowering mortality

 The outstanding feature of the

 registered Jersey heifers, between

 Oakville for \$105.00.

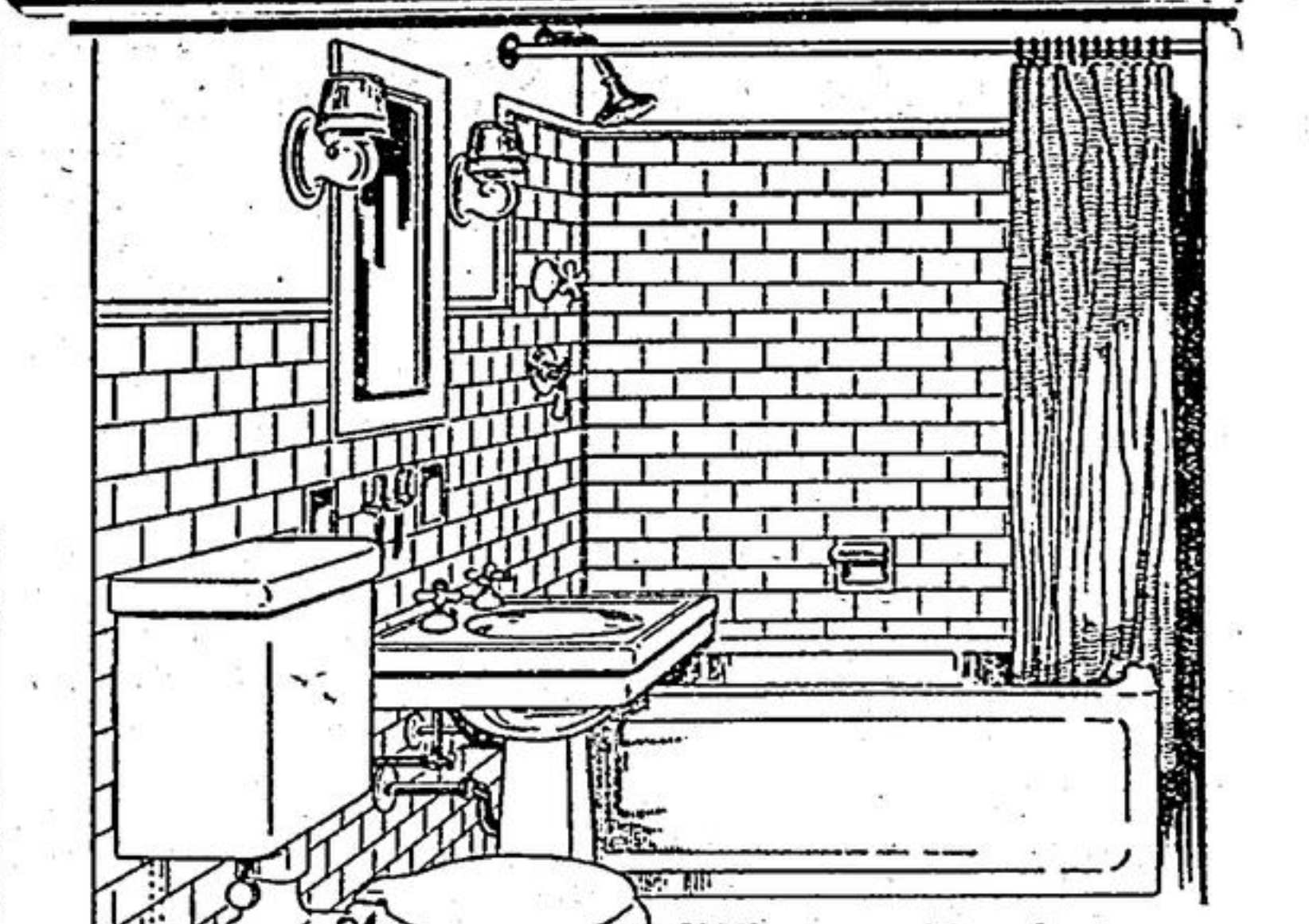

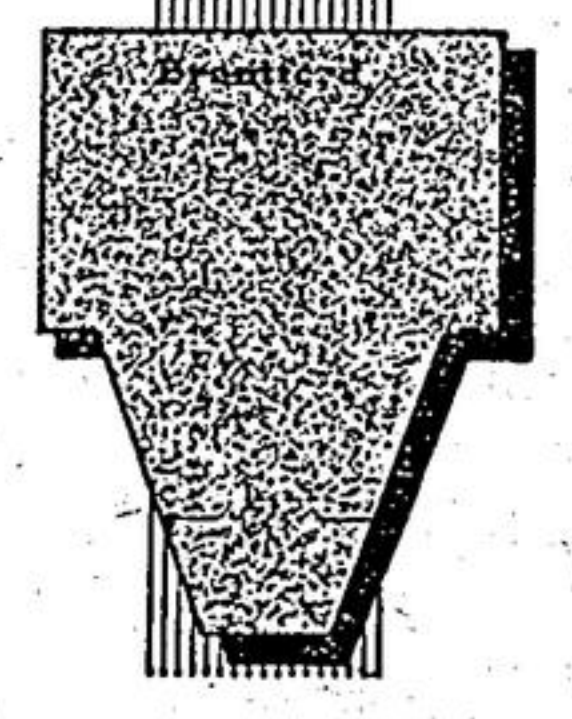
