Bringing the extremely strict tenets of their creed up to date, the Amish Mennonite Conference of Ontario, which concluded its three-day session at the Mapleview Church, Wellesley Village, has decreed that radios must be banned from all Amish Mennonite homes the sect classifying the radio with musical instruments, which have been banned from the homes of members since the sect was first founded. Musical instruments, along with modern luxuries, and even some so-called conveniences, are banned from the homes by the strict tenets of the Amish Mennonite belief as being instruments of the devil, designed to lead the faithful away from devout worship of the Almighty. 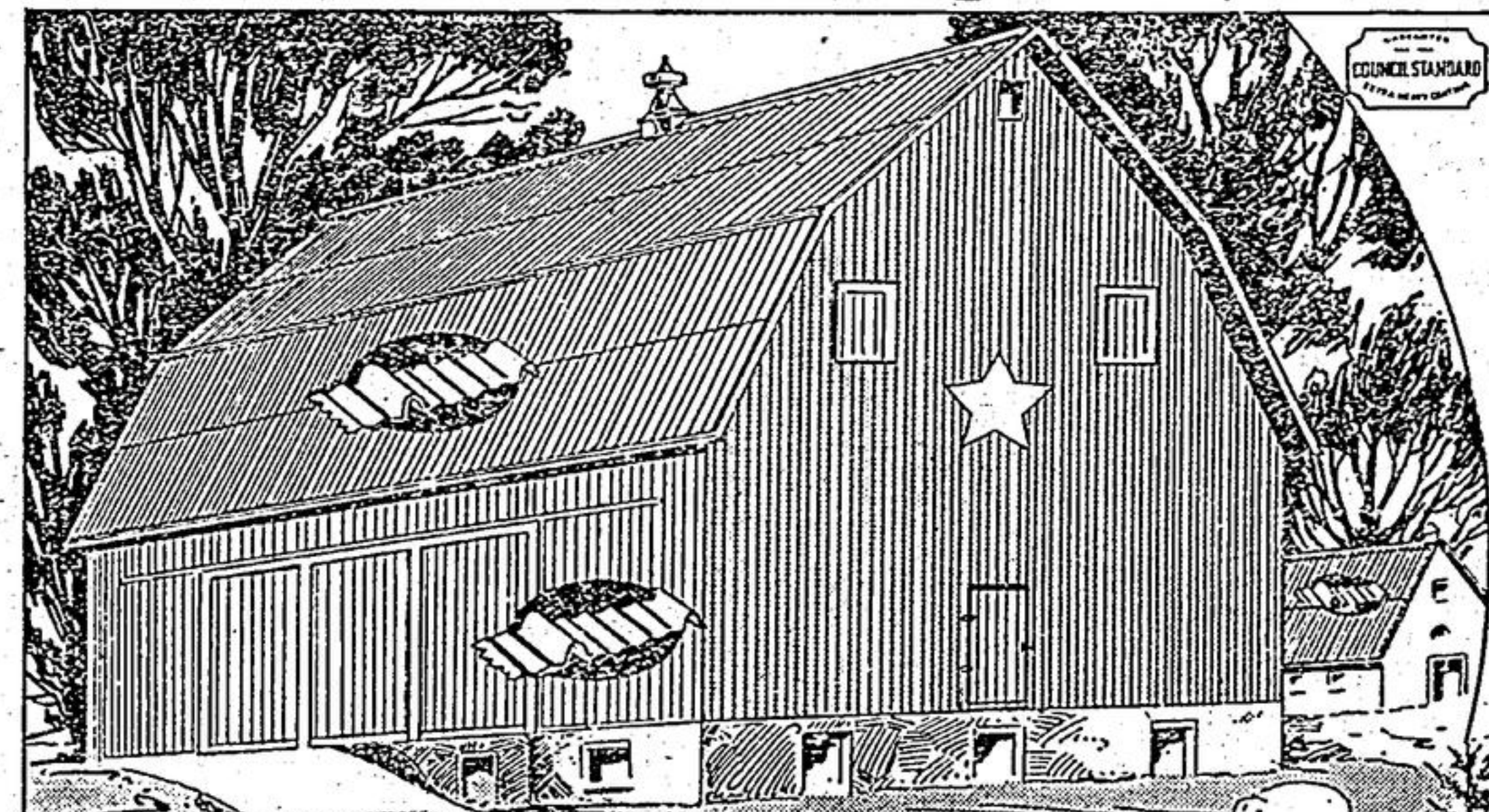
