Lucky Number Ticket Sellers From Uxbridge Lost all Their Tickets to Police

The Uxbridge branch of the Canadian Legion and the Citizens Band were thrown into a turmoil on Saturday when they learned that their Pontiac car and all the tickets had been seized by the police in Guelph that day, and was still in captivity on Monday.

The new car is to be given to the lucky ticket holder at a street dance in Uxbridge on Wednesday evening. The price of each ticket 25c admits one to the dance and a draw on the car.

When a number of ticket sellers reached Guelph on Saturday and commenced operations, the police stepped in and confiscated the car and all the tickets, claiming that the car had no license, and that tickets were being disposed of contrary to law. Native Mother Now in States Loses Cherished Son

George F. Platt is Fatally Burned in an Electrical Blaze in Big Power Plant

The Greenfield, Mass., Daily Record tells of a shocking accident which bereaved a native mother of Stouffville, when her son was fatally burned in an electrical fire which occurred at the Cabot station in the power plant of the Turner Falls Power & Light Co. At the head of the casualty list appears the name of George Flint Pratt, 20-year-old son of late Harry L. and Mary Platt. The bereaved mother will be better known to Stouffville people as Mary Flint, daughter of Mrs. George Flint and sister of Chancellor Chas. Flint of Syracuse University.

According to the press despatch a small fire developed in the cable room and the group of five men two of whom were seriously injured and two killed outright, ran to the scene with extinguishers to suppress the blaze. The superintendent who was close by, noted the fire was caused by trouble on the 6600-volt cable and warned the men to leave the scene. The Superintendent then succeeded in cutting out half the number of cable duct lines when a severe short circuit developed in those remaining, in rupturing the cable duct line and hurling flames and burning insulation some distance.

The statement said the five men

who had been using the hand extinguishers had returned to the door of the cable room and were enveloped in flames when the duct line ruptured due to the short circuit condition.

The Greenfield Record says regarding young Platt: "George Flint Pratt, 20, who was fatally burned was born in Winchester, Mass., on May 21, 1911, the son of Harry L. and Mary Platt. Some time ago he came to Montague City to make his home. He obtained a position with the Turner Falls Power & Electric Co., and attended the High School at Turner's after hours.

The young man's friends knew him as ambitious and eager to get ahead. It is said that most of the money he earned he sent to his mother who is a widow and resides in New York City. Platt was graduated from Turner's Falls High School in this year's class.

Besides his mother Platt is survived by a sister and an uncle in Boston. The mother was preparing to go on a visit to her son when the wire arrived announcing that he was mortally wounded. He died before she reached the hospital."

The many friends of the family in Stouffville will sympathize deeply with them in their untimely loss.
