When will the depression end is a question often asked but never satisfactorily answered. In its first important statement by saying that "until the situation improves in Germany there can be no general recovery from the existing state of depression." The deduction from this is first improve the situation in Germany and then general recovery will be possible.

This statement is practically the opening of the report, and the concluding one is in these words: "We therefore conclude by urging most earnestly upon all the governments concerned that they lose no time in taking the measures necessary for bringing about such conditions as will allow financial operations to bring to Germany and thereby to the world sorely needed assistance."

The report, of course tells what is necessary to bring needed assistance to Germany, and to the world, but having done that the committee's work is ended. Only the governments interested can take the next step and do the things necessary to remove the cause for the continuing depression. The committee gives a sharp reminder of the urgency of the case, in these words:

"But the time is short." The German problem, as the report clearly shows, is but a part of a larger one that concerns the whole world. We have to consider the widespread unemployment in the United States and the preparations the President is even now making for relief this winter to realize how it concerns us. We can no longer maintain the fiction that we are not interested in the matter of German reparations and kindred matters. The sufferings, past and prospective because of unemployment and the losses to business rise, up to refute the fiction.

In a great world emergency would it not be becoming in the United States to throw politics to the winds and take the leadership in initiating the "necessary measures" to bring about these better conditions?

A Hard-Luck Family

Assistance Galore Failed to Uplift Ringwood Helpless Mother and Children now Sent to Public Institutions

The daily press has been giving a good deal of prominence to the case of a destitute family at Ringwood, the reading of which would lead one to imagine that the inhabitants of the district are a hard lot, and for a church going community do not practise what they preach. Such, however, is far from the facts. Mrs. Harold Pearce and her four young children have received assistance repeatedly from the township council, from the neighbors, the Eastern Star at Stouffville and also the Women's Institute.

In communication with Councillor Ronnie The Tribune obtained the facts of the case. In July 1929 Frank Bruels engaged Harold Pearce in Toronto as a single man to work on his farm. Later he learned that he was married and Pearce was permitted to bring his wife and four children from Montreal for which Mr. Bruels found a home in Ringwood. Shortly Pearce took ill, and while in the hospital two weeks the family received aid from the municipal council to the extent of \$35. This was before the family had been here three months. If the council had been as keen as the city of Montreal to unburden themselves of responsibility they might have shipped the family back to the Royal City. Then a second time Pearce went to the hospital and council again assisted the family to the extent of \$55.

When Pearce no longer worked for Mr. Bruels he left home and the family have been the object of charitable institutions galore. Councillor Rennie finally arranged to pay the transportation of Mrs. Pearce and the four children to Montreal that she might be with her mother during an expected confinement. All along the route she appears to have received help, but on Monday evening landed back to Stouffville, where the township council through Constable Walker took charge of the woman and family putting them up at the hotel for the night then taking them back to Toronto next morning where they will be committed to an institution.

A warrant is out for the arrest of the husband for non-support. According to Councillor Rennie the home at Ringwood, when he visited it, was a dirty squalor, but the husband appeared to be on a better standard.
