### Campaign Ended

The week of special church services conducted by Gypsey Simon Smith on behalf of the Christian Church, came to a close on Sunday evening with a capacity house in the United Church. In order to accommodate as many as possible on Sunday the use of the United building was secured for both afternoon and evening. Despite the fact that at the evening service with the thermometer standing at 96 degrees the large congregation remained in their places until nearly nine o'clock when the service was dismissed, indicating that the speaker was highly interesting. Less than half a dozen people failed to stand up under the intense heat and nearly all remained throughout the service.

### Burkholder Family Gathering

The descendants of the late Daniel and Barbara (Grove) Burkholder met on the lawn of Mr. and Mrs. Amos R. Burkholder 9th con. Markham on the afternoon of Saturday Sept. 5th, inst. in honor of the two remaining daughters, and to renew acquaintanceships. One hundred and eighty persons were present to enjoy the afternoon. The progenitor of this group was one of the pioneers who came to this country a century ago to enjoy religious liberty under the British Crown. Daniel Burkholder, a grandson of the immigrant ancestor Ulrich who landed in Philadelphia in 1732, was a native of Franklin County Pennsylvania. He left Chambersburg, Pa. on horseback in 1822. When he rode into what is now Markham Village, the late Mr. Sinclair Holden was excavating for his store which stood for many years at the corner of Main and Wellington Streets.

He proceeded north on the 8th con. and exchanged his horse and saddle for 100 acres of land, it being the rear half of lot 23 con. 8. Burkholder with one named Detwiler walked to the former home in Penna. a distance of more than 400 miles. On this return journey they detoured some 200 miles to visit an uncle Lehman in eastern Ohio. The following year, in the spring of 1823, Burkholder returned to his farm bringing his team wagon, plow and other equipment necessary to begin his farming operations.

Daniel Burkholder's parents and other members of the family came to the county about the year 1826. In the year 1823 he married Miss Barbara Grove, daughter of Abraham Grove, minister, who had come into the township some fifteen years earlier. To this union there were born ten children, all of whom grew to maturity and set up homes. Two of these children survive and were present and are well preserved namely, Mrs. Christina Brillinger, Bethesda, aged 88 and Mrs. Esther Wideman, Richmond Hill, aged 84.

Mr. A. B. Shaffer, a grandson, was the capable chairman for the occasion. Among the ministers present the following took part in the program. L. W. Hoover led in the devotional and singing. L.R. Pipher, Breslau, gave an address on "Family Gatherings, Their Value Place and Purpose." J. J. Burkholder sketched the family history from coming to America to the present. Oscar Burkholder, Breslau discussed "The Family of God."

Following the program the ladies served a liberal basket lunch which was enjoyed by all present. The afternoon passed all too quickly. Family ties were strengthened. We are made to thank God for godly parentage and goodly heritage.
