Here and There

In 1930 a total of 9,272,480 cans of vegetables, exclusive of soups, were packed in Canada, an increase of 3,646,382 cans or 64.8 per cent. over the 1929 pack.

The annual harvest of maple sugar and maple syrup is now well under way. Last year total cash value of these products in Canada was \$5,250,620. Most of it comes from the province of Quebec.

"It's a long way to Mool River," crowed six lusty cockerels on the railway platform at Nanaimo recently. It was their first trans-continental journey from Vancouver Island to Mool River, Nal., South Africa.

In figures drawn from the provincial government statistics, it appears that motor accidents at level crossings during 1930 total only 1,0451 per cent. of all automobile accidents occurring in the Province of Quebec in that year.

Grow in Popularity

In 1927 Canada's consumption of sheep and lambs stood at 6.09 lbs. per capita per annum, and by 1930 this had increased to 7.10 pounds. This increase of one per cent. roughly, is seemingly small, but it is really impressive. With our present population of about ten million people, the one pound increase represents 10,000,000 pounds, or about 300,000 animals, or eight per cent. of our total sheep population.

Cement Wash Helps

The increased use of wall-board in the construction and lining of poultry houses shows that birds sometimes peck at the wall-board material and do considerable damage. An effective way to overcome this difficulty is to use a mixture of equal parts of lime and cement mixed with water to the consistency of a thick paste, and apply with a brush. This mixture forms a hard, durable surface on which the birds can make no impression.

Record O.A.C. Enrolment

Figures furnished by Dr. G. I. Christie, president of O.A.C., reveal that the registration of new students this year is the largest in the institution's history there being 395 students at the O.A.C. and MacDonald Institute.

Crop Report

The production outlook for agriculture in Ontario is excellent, according to reports received from representatives. The harvesting of a record crop in several lines of production is about completed and most of it has been garnered in good condition. Pastures in Western and Central Ontario have been good and recent rains in the eastern sections have greatly improved the condition of this very important crop. Live stock has been in good condition. Farmers are well advanced with their work. More after-harvest cultivation has been done this year than in any recent seasons. Soil conditions have been favorable to the preparation of fall wheat land and early sown crops are looking well. Fall plowing is well advanced. Marketing conditions continue extremely discouraging.

Use Home-Grown Feeds

During the year 1930 Canada imported approximately 4,000,000 bushels of corn from the United States and over 5,000,000 bushels from other countries, principally Argentine. A large part of this was used for feeding purposes. This looks like an enormous amount of feed to be imported into a country that is essentially agricultural and should be self-sustaining to a very large degree in feed stuffs. Feeders will do considerable toward helping the agricultural situation by insisting on home-grown feeds. With prospects of a very large crop of excellent corn in Ontario this year it is not too early for both dealers and farmers to begin planning to dispose of that crop. Ontario corn, properly dried, is the equal of the best imported feed corn; Ontario corn properly selected and carefully handled is superior to imported strains for seed purposes.

Reforestation Work

Farmers generally are taking increased interest in reforestation work and it is interesting to note that over 6,000,000 forest trees were distributed from the Government Station at St. Williams alone in 1931 to reclaim waste land. More than 2,600 private land-owners procured forest trees last spring either for reclamation work or for windbreaks. The nursery stock at the St. Williams Station is in excellent shape and more than 8,000,000 trees will be available in 1932.

Render Important Service

The important work which agricultural representatives are doing in the rural districts of Ontario is probably not fully appreciated although it is receiving greater recognition each year. Many of the representatives have been with the department over a long period of years, have gained a very useful knowledge and are serving their respective districts most capably. It is learned that thirty of the representatives have been in the service five years or more; 14 for fifteen years or more; 9 for sixteen years; 8 for seventeen years; 7 for eighteen years; 5 for nineteen years, and one for twenty years. Since the present director, R. S. Duncan, assumed office 14 years ago, there has been a turnover of 66 agricultural representatives in the service. Twelve are now farming, 36 are still connected with agriculture in some way or other, and 18 have allied themselves with other business.
