When with the use of suitable chemicals they can be converted into manure the question "Why burn straw stacks?" is really pertinent. The use of 100 pounds of ammonium sulphate and 100 lbs of lime to each ton of straw, and this thorougrly soaked with water produces a manure of distinct fertilizer value. 
