Instead of mailing the hydro accounts to customers this month, the town clerk has had them delivered by a carrier from door to door. A short two-act play "Christmas at The Stebins" will be presented and will be followed by the Commencement Exercises. The speaker of the evening will be Mr. A. M. 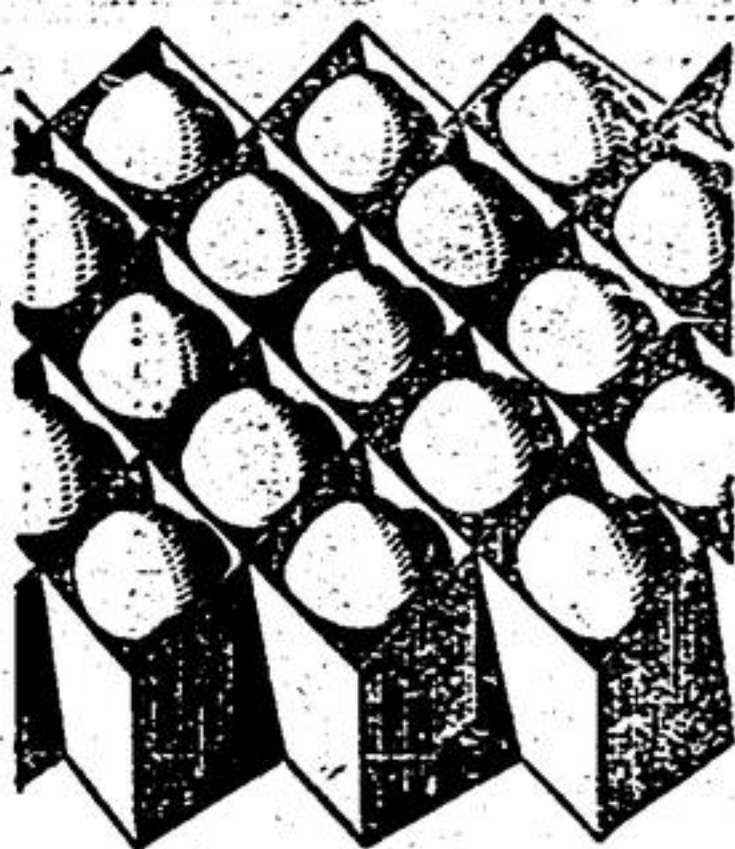

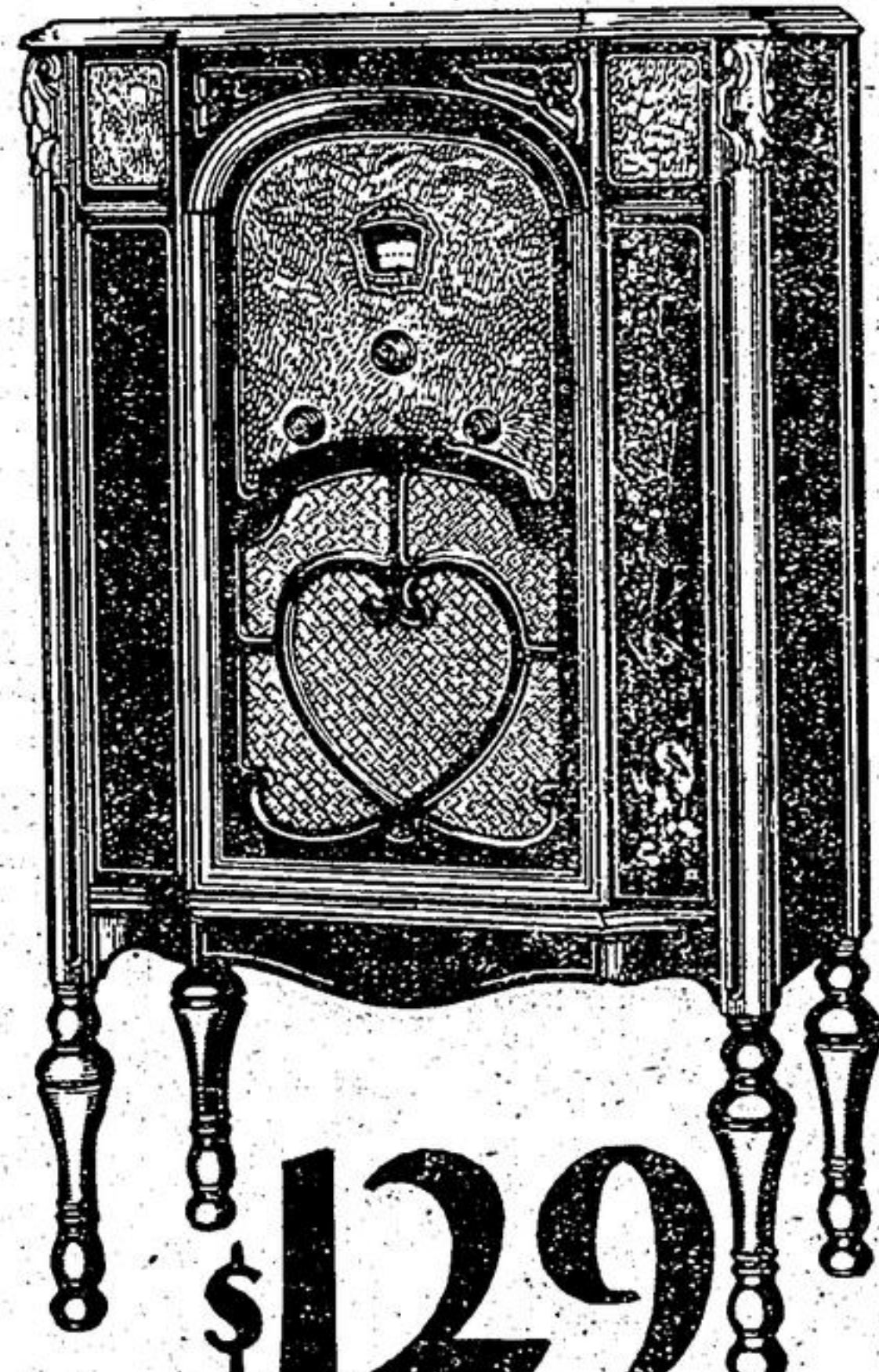
