It is said that the production of butter in Ontario at this time is as great as the total demand, thus allowing no chance for the storage butter to be brought out. The local creamery reports butter going into storage weekly because of the slackened demand.

REV. LEMMEADOWS ACCEPTS CALL TO DAYTON, OHIO CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH

Parsons come and Parsons go, but seldom has the resignation of any reverend gentleman of any denomination in town caused such widespread regret as that of the Rev. Fay Le Meadows, who on Monday evening handed his resignation to the official board of the Newmarket Christian Church.

Five years ago, from the South of the United States, a youth of twenty-four left the country of his birth to take a "charge" in the wilds of Canada. Associates who saw a bright future for the slip of a minister, shook their heads at his folly. To-day, due to his untiring effort, genial disposition and organizing ability the Christian Church, the Church at the "Top of the Hill," with its splendid organization throughout stands a living monument for his five years of constant effort.

In conversation with Mr. Meadows yesterday we asked the much asked question "won't you reconsider your resignation? Your board are anxious for you to stay on. The congregation want you to stay. The whole town are more than anxious that you remain with them. What do you say?"

"I have given my definite word," he replied. "I can't go back on it. Just as I told the board of this church, that I would come, I have given my word to the church at Dayton. Do not think it is easy for me to break the ties that for the past five years have been gradually growing, but after due consideration and through investigation, I deem that the call is one of challenge and opportunity that does not often come the way of a minister of my age. I am sure that the flourishing condition of the church here will attract some of the best minds of the denomination, and that the pulp committee will have a great number of talented ministers to choose from."
