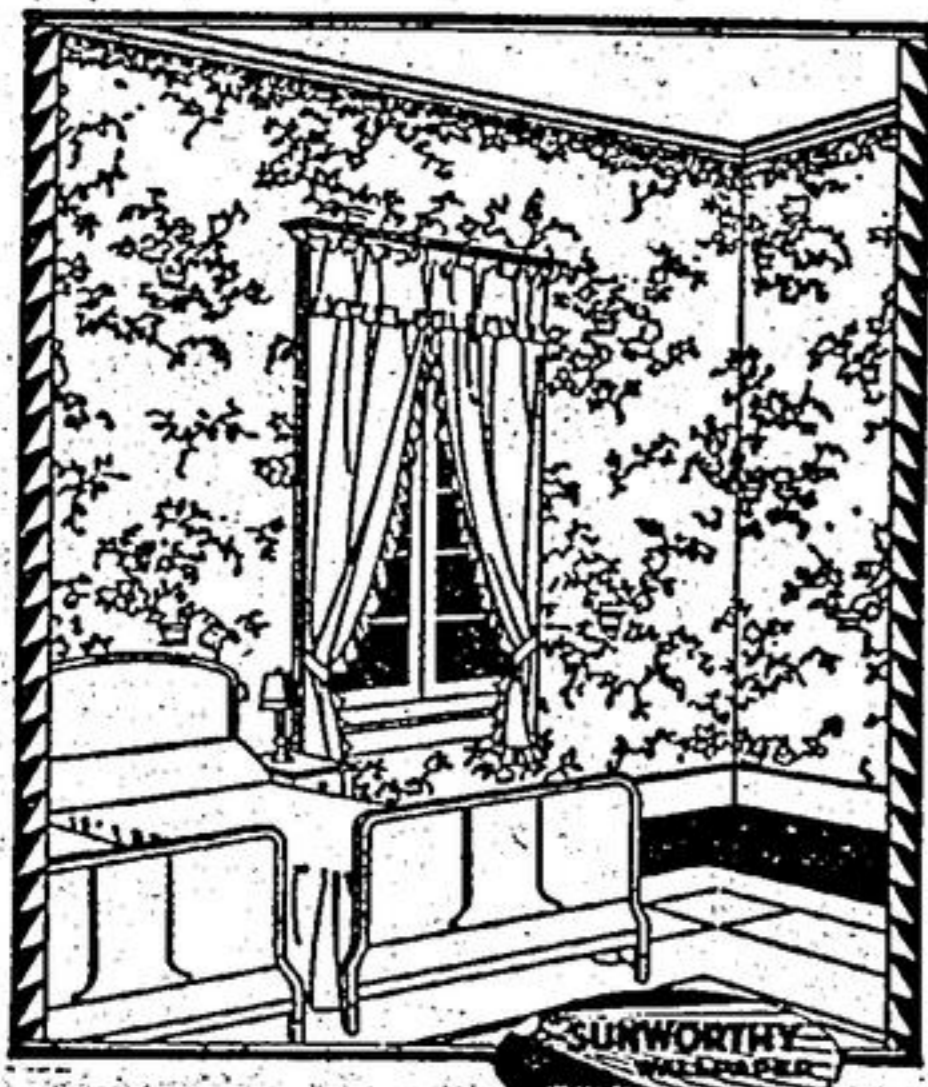

Hostilities Injure Trade

Flour Exports Are on Cash Basis — Large Cash Business Done in Potatoes — Salt Herring Industry Stopped — Pulp Still Goes

Vancouver 13.—If hostilities in the Orient continue for very long, transpacific trade developed in recent years by Canada may be seriously threatened, according to shipping men and foreign trade operators here.

Canadian flour exports are being sold strictly on a cash basis, exporters state, and this will probably continue as long as there exists any uncertainty regarding delivery and credit. This situation they point out, cannot last long without impairing relations between buyer and seller because long credit has been one of the fundamentals of business with the Far East.

Want Potatoes

There has been a sudden increase in the demand for Canadian potatoes in the Orient and some large shipments have been made, also on a cash basis. There was a similar demand for potatoes when the British concentrated troops in Shanghai several weeks ago at the time of the Chinese boycott against British goods.

The Chinese boycott against Japanese goods in the present disturbance has had serious effects on at least one Canadian industry. China has for several years been a large buyer of British Columbia salted herring. When it became known that a considerable volume of this herring was caught and packed by Japanese in British Columbia the product was placed on the blacklist, and several large shipments to China have been left to rot on the wharves in Shanghai. The salt herring industry in British Columbia was forced to shut down before the season was half over.

Pulp Exports Continue

Exporters of pulp say that the situation has not yet affected them and that shipments to both Japan and China have not been interrupted. If hostilities continue long, however, there is always a possibility of Japan establishing a blockade of certain Chinese ports in the event of which Canadian pulp, as well as other goods, would not reach its destination. Meantime the exchange situation is the chief deterrent to Far Eastern trade, the fluctuation on the Japanese market making it difficult to fix a price assuring a fair return.

Notes and Comments

Tax collector near Ottawa is short \$6,653 in the cash he turned in, but it was on account of a poor method in keeping books. Perhaps he did his figuring on the back of an envelope.

The Ontario Federation of Anglers at their annual meeting in Toronto last week, decided to request the Fish & Game Dept. to change the open season for trout season shortening it, so that Aug. 31 would be the last day for fishing instead of September 15th.

A. C. Apple is a rancher near Red Bluff, Cal. In the night he heard a noise on the porch and went to investigate. In the darkness he aimed a blow at a moving object, and got one in return that floored him. He had struck Bessie, the family cow, and Bessie had kicked back as she had a perfect right to do.

Mr. Robert Kahl, whose farm is included within the limits of public school section No. 6, Carriek, but sends his children to Mildmay Public School, is suing the rural school for \$19.50 in the Division Court. Plaintiff says the Mildmay school is more accessible than P.S.S. No. 6, and therefore claims that under the Statutes he is entitled to be paid back the fees he pays to Mildmay school. The case will probably be tried at Walkerton on February 16—Mildmay Gazette.

Legislation suggested by the Henry Government in the Speech from the Throne yesterday will allow a rebate of approximately \$7,000 to York County, to repay the excess amount contributed by the municipality toward Old Age Pensions since August of last year. Hollis E. Beckett, secretary of the York County Old Age Pension Committee, announced.

The Federal Government has assumed 75 per cent. of the cost and the province and municipalities take over the balance, Mr. Beckett stated. The legislation was framed to be retroactive to last August.

According to economic experts, the earth will support 5,200,000,000 people and the present rate of increase is 12,000,000 per year. At that rate in 100 years the population will be 56 billion or four people to the acre instead of two and a half, which, economists declare is all an acre is able to support. Discussing the Japanese situation, which undoubtedly is a result of overpopulation, we might compare the size of Ontario with that of Japan. Ontario consisted of 407,000 square miles, and Japan 148,000. Only 20 per cent. of the Japanese area is arable, and in that 20 per cent 64 million people live or 3½ people to the acre which is one more person than an acre is able to support.

Many of the old pioneers laugh when we mention hard times and suggest that instead of hard times we are in luxury. Some of them can recall when they did not have a bite of white bread to eat for months, but lived on a ration of oatmeal, turnips or potatoes. If our relief committees offered any such meal to the needy families of today it would be spurned as an insult, and they would likely ask for a beef loaf, breakfast cereal, fruit and candy. Times may not be as prosperous as they were a couple of years ago, but we are still far removed from the time when the farmer carried his grist to the mill and carried the flour home again if he wanted bread.

Ratepayers in every municipality should make strenuous effort to pay their taxes on or before the first day of March. In most cases additional penalties are added after that date. Whitechurch Township has undertaken to lighten the load a wee bit by reducing the customary penalty of 5 per cent now on all unpaid tax bills, to only 2 per cent. It doesn't mean a great deal but it shows a sympathetic attitude. The average farmer pays \$100 or more taxes, hence he stands to save three or four dollars, a sum that will keep the average family in groceries for a week at least. Delinquent tax payers must "buck" up the money by March 1st to obtain the reduction, otherwise they must pay the full penalty.

MODERN PARABLE PRODIGAL FATHER

Although lacking the atmosphere of inspiration peculiar to the parable of the Prodigal Son, the following nevertheless is a great challenge to the fathers of our day: "A certain man had two sons, and the younger of them said to his father: Father, give me the portion of thy time, attention, companionship and counsel which falleth to me. And he divided unto them his living in that he paid the boy's bills and sent him to school and tried to believe that he was doing his full duty. And not many days after the father gathered all his interests and inspirations and took his journey into a far country, into a land of Stocks and Bonds and Securities and other things which do not interest a boy; and there he wasted his precious opportunity of being a chum to his own son. And when he had spent the very best of his life and had gained money there arose a mighty famine in his heart and, he began to be in want of sympathy and companionship. He said: How many men of my acquaintance have boys whom they understand and who understand them, who talk about their boys and associate with them and seem perfectly happy in the comradeship of their sons, and I perish here with heart-hunger? I will arise and go to my son. And he arose and came to his son. But, while he was yet afar off, his son saw him and was moved with astonishment. He drew back and was ill at ease. "Son," he said, I have sinned against Heaven and in thy sight I am not worthy to be called thy father. Forgive me now and let me be your friend. But the son said: Not so, I wish it were possible, but it is too late. There was a time when I wanted companionship and counsel and to know things, but you were too busy. I got companionship and I got information, but I got the wrong kind and now alas! I am wrecked in body and soul, there is no more heart left in me and there is nothing you can do for me. It is too late, too late. (A mother could apply the same article to her association with her daughter.)
