J. Halbert, well-known Thornton farmer, shipped a carload of potatoes through the first Co-operative Packers of Ontario, Ltd., Barrie, to Fraserdale, at the end of steel on the T. and N.O. Railway, about 65 miles north of Cochrane and 500 miles from Thornton. Mr. Halbert received 15 cents per bag or \$75 for the 500 bags in the carload, while the railway freight charges on the long haul amounted to \$253, or nearly three and one-half times the net amount received by the farmer who grew the potatoes.

## Farmers' Information

### Buy Quality Seed

"As never before in the history of farming should care be exercised in the purchase of seeds for planting this spring." is the advice of one well-known authority, who adds that it is doubly important to make sure that purchases have been government-tested as a result of last year's drought and the reduced supply of high quality stock. He warns against buying bargain seeds where price alone is the only description given because advertisements where seeds are offered at stipulated prices without any indication as to their quality or origin. It would actually be cheaper to buy the best the market affords than to take the poorest as a gift, he concludes.

### Weekly Crop Report

Alfalfa and clover crops are reported as badly damaged from heaving in some districts. The recent cold spell put a stop to seeding operations which had been started in some districts. Bruce County reports that most farmers are either getting seed cleaned or arranging to have it cleaned and that county has sufficient for all needs for practically all classes of crops. Brant County reports a similar condition. Potatoes have been selling at 25c a bag in Middlesex. Field mice were busy on the farm of John Kidd, Inglewood, Peel County, and severely girdled over 100 20-year-old Spruce and Baldwin trees. The orchard was held in a sod mulch which harbored hundreds of these pests. Arsenate of lime mixed with corn meal proved an effective poison bait when spread in a circle around the base of the tree. Live stock is wintering in excellent condition in Temiskaming, with an abundance of good hay and a considerable quantity of grain.

### Should Check Fertilizer

This is the season for buying fertilizers and it is important that farmers should know how to protect themselves in making sure that they are delivered the kind and analysis of fertilizer which they purchase. The Federal Fertilizers Act requires that every fertilizer delivered to a farmer must be labelled with the guaranteed analysis in terms of nitrogen, phosphoric acid and potash. Therefore the farmer should check the guaranteed analysis of the fertilizer when it arrives. If short one per cent. nitrogen, it is worth about \$2.50 a ton less than the purchase price and phosphoric acid and potash are worth about \$1 for each per cent. Purchasers are advised to refuse acceptance of fertilizer which is not labelled precisely the same guaranteed analysis as that purchased. Should any farmer have reason to doubt the value of a fertilizer delivered to him, he is advised to communicate with the nearest fertilizer inspector or the district representative of agriculture.

### Free Trees

Owing to the fact that the Forestry Branch has a surplus of trees on hand this year, the former limit of 3500 trees for reforestation purposes will not be adhered to, and any land owner in the Province of Ontario may procure additional quantities free of charge by applying to the Ontario Forestry Branch, Parliament Buildings, Toronto, Ontario.

The above ruling handed down presents a wonderful opportunity that may only be available this year. Planting stock is classified as—

- (a) Trees for reforesting waste land.
- (b) Trees for windbreak purposes.

Applications should be submitted on or before 31st March, 1932. Further information about type of trees best suited to various soil conditions can be procured from the Forestry Branch.

The only expense to the farmer is the express on the trees. This is not a large sum as the trees are small.

### The Use of Fertilizers

The primary function of a fertilizer is to furnish plant food in forms which are immediately available, or which may readily become so, in the soil.

One of the main factors in determining crop yields is the amount of plant food available in the soil. When this is not sufficient for good growth it must be supplemented if maximum yields are to be obtained.

The several factors which may profoundly affect the results obtained from applying fertilizer include the character of the soil, drainage and methods of working the soil, and the character of the season in respect to rainfall, temperature, etc.

In considering the use of commercial fertilizers one must keep in mind the necessity of maintaining organic matter in the soil as supplied by manure. The principal value in the use of fertilizer is that it permits a more economical and better distribution of farm manure. One is a necessary supplement to the other, and for most soils they work together to produce the best results.
