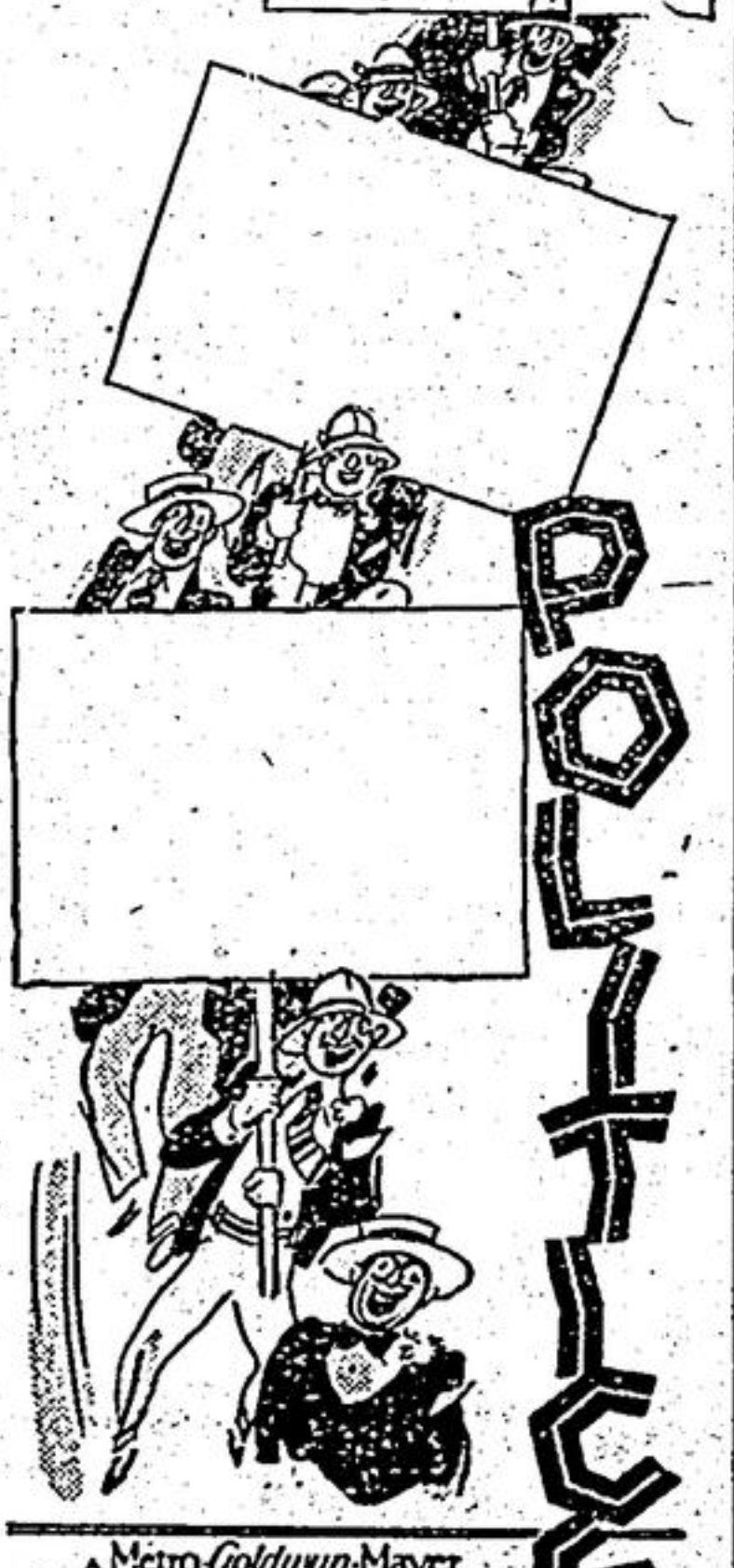

With the horse sort of being turned down in favor of automobiles, the business dwindled, and finally passed off the scene. Three years ago the fine barns of this 75 acre place were destroyed by fire and have never been rebuilt. The residence on the property was built by the Jones people in Uxbridge and was said to have cost \$20,000. It contains 20 rooms and the entire place is finished in No. 1 oak. Since the death of William Graham over a year ago the place is occupied by Mr. Tom Graham and his sister Miss Margaret Graham whom we understand may move to Claremont.

Work has commenced on the erection of a new dwelling house on the farm of Mr. Alf. McDonald, south of Woodgood on the third concession. The cellar excavation is complete, and the cement wall is now going up. The site of the new house is just to the south of the burned structure, where the awful tragedy occurred last winter when fire destroyed the home and took the life of the mother, while the family of children and father barely escaped a similar fate. The new house will be a frame structure 22 feet square.
