WATER SUPPLY

Owing to the extent of the drought last week, the reeve was com- celled. pelled to issue curtailment orders to all domestic water users. This is quite customary at this time of year, and is unfortunate. It's a great privilege to have plenty of water, but the amount that would be required to satisfy all the Stouff ville users would drain Lake Ontario according to some estimates.

Over 50 per cent of the homes nowadays are operating a hose on lawn, garden or cabbage patch. Some gardens are like small farms in size, hence the demand is tremendous. Coupled with this is the wastage where householders, fully or otherwise, allow lawn hose to run all night. The request sen out by the reeve to ease up on the use of lawn hose was generally well observed. Such a request should be obeyed as these orders do not go forward unless the supply is depleted to a point where further shrinklage in the reservoirs would leave us in peril should a fire occur.
