**HOSE DEPLETED THE WATER SUPPLY**

Owing to the extent of the drought last week, the revee was compelled to issue curtailment orders to all domestic water users. This is quite customary at this time of year, and is unfortunate. It's a great privilege to have plenty of water, but the amount that would be required to satisfy all the Stouffville users would drain Lake Ontario according to some estimates.  
Over 50 per cent of the homes nowadays are operating a hose on lawn, garden or cabbage patch. Some gardens are like small farms in size, hence the demand is tremendous. Coupled with this is the wastage where householders, willfully or otherwise, allow lawn hose to run all night. The request sent out by the revee to ease up on the use of lawn hose was generally well observed. Such a request should be obeyed as these orders do not go forward unless the supply is depleted to a point where further shrinkage in the reservoirs would leave us in peril should a fire occur.  
Some thought might profitably be given to enlarging the storage capacity of our reservoirs, in view of the fact that for possibly seven months of the year water is running away through the overflow pipes.  
It is also suggested that a system of metering water to those using it for other than purely domestic purposes might be devised, and additional revenue obtained from it, to warrant the expense of installing more capacity at the reservoir for the surplus water which goes to waste in the wet seasons.

**PROCEEDINGS INSTITUTED AGAINST WILL**

Condit, Religious Education Director of the same Conference, led in a Round Table session, discussing particularly Young People's workings in Sunday Schools and other Young People's organizations. Mrs. Mattie White, foreign mission worker for Women's Boards, also of the same Conference, gave the Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Society very helpful guidance in their work.  
There were present, also Rev. G. A. Conbear, president of the New York State Christian Association; Rev. Heber O. Harz, Associate Dean of Lakemont Summer School; and Rev. J. A. Foss, president of the New York Central Christian Conference. Their helpfulness found its place on each programme. Prof. J. N. Dales, Field Secretary of the New York State Christian Association and Dean of the Lakemont Summer School in his usual cheerful manner helped to guide all matters of business.  
Dr. G. W. Hunter of Olivet Congregational Church, Toronto, in his address on the opening evening, challenged the Conference to be mindful of their religious relations, especially so in these trying times. He pointed out that the inclination of the world at large was indifference instead of sincerity of purpose. **PICKERING COUNTY ASSESSMENT INCREASED**

The County Council on Friday morning adopted by a vote of 16 to 6 a resolution, introduced by Reeve E. L. Chapman, of Pickering, "that in view of the present financial condition of the country which has brought about our present depreciation in values in the minor municipalities, that the equalized assessment of 1931 be the basis on which shall be established the 1932 levy, with the following exception, namely, that the Township of Reach be relieved of \$12,000 equalized assessment and that same be added to the Township of Pickering." The effect of this resolution is that the equalization on which county taxation in every municipality has been based since 1926 shall prevail for another year, with the change noted being made in Reach and Pickering Township assessments.

The resolution as adopted means further the scrapping of report brought in by a special committee appointed at the January session to equalize the assessment of the minor municipalities pursuant to statute and which after over four days' deliberations before the present session opened, and several hours afterwards, recommended an increase in the whole equalized assessment of the county of \$1,087,537. On the committee were Messrs. Chapman, Rowe, MacKey, Parrott, Bruce, Catherwood and Johnston, and they were paid \$450 a day each for four days, amounting to \$1800, and to this was added the mileage allowances, bring the total cost of the report up to a figure well over \$200.  
Some 900 extra tax papers have come to the township since 1926 it was stated in the discussion.
