**Farmers' Information**

**Adopt Egg Regulations**  
Amendments to the federal egg regulations have now been finally adopted by the province of Ontario. The egg regulations are administered by the Federal Department under the authority of Federal statute, and their adoption by Ontario makes them fully operative throughout the Dominion. The general principle of the regulations is not altered in any way in the amendments. Some changes have been made in country buying regulations designed to secure for the producer full graded value for his product.

**Canadian Millfeed Export Swings to United Kingdom.**  
The United Kingdom has taken the place of the United States, as the chief buyer of Canadian millfeeds. This was indicated when, during a recent month, Canada exported 18,287 cwt. of bran, shorts, and middlings. Of this amount 13,610 cwt. went to the United Kingdom, while the United States took 1,101 cwt., Bermuda took

2,234 cwt. Other markets imported smaller quantities including Jamaica, Trinidad, Hong Kong, Newfoundland, St. Pierre, and Miquelon.

**Cereal Feed for Broilers**  
A test was carried on at the poultry division, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, comparing two rations, one of which contained meat meal and the other cereal feeds only, for fattening broilers. Equal parts of ground wheat, ground oats and ground barley made up the cereal ration with the addition of 10 per cent of meat meal to the other. Both were fed three times daily, using sour skim-milk as a mixer and mixing each feed one feeding in advance. Two lots of chickens seven weeks of age were used. Thirty-seven birds were in one and thirty-six in the other group. These birds were banded and weighed individually in grams at the beginning, at the end of the first week and at the end of the experiment (14 days). The average gain for the two lots was practically identical, the difference being only one-tenth of an ounce per bird.

**Tomato Cutworm Control**  
An effective control has been found for cutworms by spreading moist, poisoned bran mash around the plants after sundown. Since cutworms are night feeders it is important to have the mash freshly spread and in an attractive condition during the night time. The worms will take this bait and die. Make the mash as follows, 50 pounds bran, 1-2 pound white arsenic or 1 pound Paris Green. Mix these thoroughly together, then add water enough to make a moist mash, and add one pint of cheap molasses to sweeten the bait.

**An Open Letter**

Brief Outline of Scheme to Beautify Memorial Park

Dear Sir,  
Some time ago Dr. Sangster approached me regarding the cost of a swimming pool and rock garden, and after a short survey I found that for the sum of \$550 it would be possible to undertake work, which I here outline as follows:  
The construction is proposed to be made in the west corner of the grounds south of the Creamery. About 20 feet below the recently built south roadway of the Horticultural Society's demonstration garden, I will build a swimming pool about 30x30' with a depth running from 1' one side to about 6' on the other. Near the bridge on Sommerville street there will be a cut-off from the old creek and the water coming from the north down the creekbed is going to be partly filtered and brought on through a filtration plant to the swimming pool. The water will pass through several screen boxes filled with Chloride of Lime which seeps through 15 yards of gravel and sand. This process will give a guarantee that the water is absolutely pure and clean, and free of germs. The pool will run along a line drawn from northwest to southwest. In the west-end of the pool there will be underwater fountains installed which keeps the water in the bottom of the pool in churning motion. In the centre we find a big fountain which is erected on a square platform. The water will be thrown 25' into the air and the fine spray of water coming down will bring an immense amount of oxygen into the water. This oxygen has a peculiar reaction on the physical system of the human body. It will banish the tiresome effects of the nitrate contents of the water. The pool will be built on a sloping principle in order to make it impossible for anyone to slip and drown. All the deep parts of the pool will be properly fenced and protected and accessible for only such persons who are sufficiently acquainted with the art of swimming. Any person entering the deep part of the pool must go through a shower in order to cool the body off and by doing so prevent heart attacks. One corner of the pool will be sufficiently deep enough for diving purpose. The southerly line will be formed by an island imbedded between the pool and the old creekbed. The topsoil on this island will be taken off to a level of about 2 1/2' above the creek-water level. The pond level will be about 1' above the creek level. The drop of the creek from near Sommerville street bridge to the outlet of the swimming pool, I found 3'. This gives sufficient drop to keep the water in the swimming pool in good movement. The island as well as the bottom of the swimming pool is gravelled. On this island the children's playground will be found as well. Coming from Main street, through the arches of the Horticultural Demonstration Garden we will pass south and see to our right a hill about 15' above the water level and 50' in diameter with a path leading in a half circle around. About 11' above water level we find 3 stone benches facing different directions. 9' above the water level on the southside there is a lily pool and an artificial waterfall, while southwest from there after encircling the hill we descend and go in to a grotto. The openings facing the pool, on each corner of the grotto there are colored reflectors throwing light towards the centre of the pool and into the spray of the fountain, giving the water a beautiful colored light effect.  
To the west of the hill we find a rockgarden built on the terrace style principal. Further we see a bridge near the in and outlet of the pond leading across a small creek onto the island. This will in general give everybody an idea about the work to be done in the park.  
All the work would be let by contracts, so I am able to guarantee the correctness of the price.  
One thing has to be kept in mind and this is that the whole of the work is done by the co-operation of the people and will stand as a monument of the goodwill of the citizens of Stouffville.  
On account of lack of space I am not able to point out the good features of a public swimming pool in regard to the great healthfactor, the educational value and the great drawing point imbedded therein.
