Largest Fair in History of Horticultural Society

The ninth annual exhibition of the Stouffville Horticultural Society held last Thursday and Friday, was by far the largest and most successful yet recorded. In fact the Departmental judges who came here placed the exhibits in both quality and quantity in the first ranks of any fair in the province.

The great number of flower entries completely filled the large floor space available in the arena, which is such an ideal building for this exhibition. A corner was reserved for the lunch counter, where the society's committee, and the girl waiters worked hard to meet the demand for ice cream and cake.
