The writer for this column was more or less amazed as we sat in the Royal York hotel the other day while in attendance at the Gladioli exhibition, to see so many young girls smoking or carrying cigarette cases. The ninth annual exhibition of the Stouffville Horticultural Society held last Thursday and Friday, was by far the largest and most successful yet recorded. In fact the Departmental judges who came here placed the exhibits in both quality and quantity in the first ranks of any fair in the province. Barrie, with 500 entries is said to have the largest horticultural fair, and Stouffville had over 700 entries, while the average society report 400. In cut flowers alone there was exhibited here 546 entries, and 68 in house plants. 115 entries were made in vegetable classes.

The directors, under the energetic leadership of J. R. Hodgins made no mistake on deciding on a two-day fair in place of the original one-day. Finally and otherwise the longer time was best. The gorgeous decorations so elaborately displayed in the arena was the work of Mr. Geo. Saunders and drew forth plenty of favorable comment. It made an ideal setting for the flower exhibits. A splendid program was provided each night. On the opening evening the Toronto (Symphony) orchestra and Anthony Remouch, the noted boy violinist entertained a large audience. For the closing evening the Airion Male Choir of Toronto under the leadership of G. W. Weese rendered an excellent program. Dorothy Merrill whose father is a member of the choir, excelled herself with eucalyptary numbers. Mrs. Harold Lewis, Mr. Chas. Boardway and the Stouffville ladies' quartette also contributed numbers that were greatly appreciated.

The great number of flower entries completely filled the large floor space available in the arena, which is such an ideal building for this exhibition. A corner was reserved for the lunch counter, where the society's committee, and the girl waiters worked hard to meet the demand for ice cream and cake.
