Most efforts to keep clear of stable flies have been restricted to spraying the flies on the cows. The suggestion is now made that the flies be fought in the stable as well. The idea is to spray the flies with a killing spray while they are settled in the walls and ceiling. If this spraying is done in the early morning it will be more effective as the flies are then sluggish in their movements. Late afternoon is also a good time. Close the stable and spray with a fine mist that fills the air. One part of formalin in 19 parts of milk or sweetened water makes a good and cheap spray. The same mixture may be left around in plates for the flies to drink. Keeping all manure cleared away from the stable and yards will remove breeding places for the flies and reduce the nuisance. Where it is not convenient to move the manure to the fields, it should be kept in a screened shed.

WHEAT RESULTS OF INTEREST

Two interesting fertilizer tests with wheat have been conducted in York County throughout the past summer. The Department of Chemistry, Ontario Agricultural College, applied fertilizers to one-third acre blocks at the rate of 375 lbs. per acre on the farm of Frank Marritt at Keswick.

The wheat followed a good sod and received an additional application of ten loads of manure per acre.

2-12-6 fertilizer yielded 41.3 bus. per acre, weighing 57 lbs. per bus. 2-16-6 fertilizer yielded 43.3 bus. per acre weighing 60 lbs. per bus. 0-12-15 fertilizer yielded 43 bus. per acre weighing 60 lbs. per bus. While no fertilizer yielded 40.1 bus per acre, weighing 57.5 lbs. per bushel.

On the farm of Mr. J. A. Ledson, Vandorf, 0-14-6 at the same rate, yielded 30.6 bushels per acre weighing 57 lbs. per bushel; 2-12-6 yielded 32.8 bushels weighing 57 lbs while the unfertilized wheat yielded 20.6 bushels per acre weighing 55 lbs. per bushel.
