Notes and Comments

Five Townships in Ontario were given an opportunity this January by way of the ballot, to return to Statute labor for doing their road work. The bylaw was defeated in every instance, as was to be expected. The present system was evolved in order to give the rural sections a portion of taxes collected from gasoline and motor licenses, and while it doesn't appear to be a perfect arrangement, it is the best we can get at the moment, and will get more work done for the money than under the old statute labor plan.

Henry Connor was put in the cells at Richmond, Vt., the cells being in the town hall. Henry felt rather cold in the place. He forced the door and found some books on a desk. He tore a few pages from them and started a little fire in the stove in the corridor. Then he added some more pages until he was warmer. It was found he had burned up the town records, including the tax lists.

With more than 80,000 families now on direct relief in Ontario—that is, some 400,000 men, women and children obtaining all their food and clothing through relief channels—the province's bill in this regard is mounting so rapidly and attaining such proportions that further instructions concerning economy and drastic supervision of expenditures are likely to be issued shortly from Queen's Park to all participating municipalities. Premier Henry also says a moratorium will be put on mortgages, even if interest is in arrears, if the debtor shows he cannot possibly pay. Many investors in Stouffville will be vitally interested in this new legislation, as city house mortgages, and farm mortgages are perhaps the chief investment here, and loom large. We fear that if a man can get behind with interest payments and be protected by law from loss of the property involved, he will not be in a hurry to pay up. If this proposal ever becomes law, it will be mighty difficult to obtain any more money from investors for mortgage purposes.

Ontario County Council Co-Operation Necessary

While the municipal elections made six changes in the Ontario County Council of 1933, the majority of last year's members and some new ones have already returned by acclamation. Some who have served for years will also be missed from the 1933 Board.

In Pickering Reeve E. L. Chapman is back, but his deputy, Allan B. Moore, has been replaced by a former reeve, G. Luther Middleton. The warden, Robert Somerville, after eight years of service in his home village of Port Perry, has stepped aside, and his place is taken by Mr. W. M. Letcher, who has been a member of the Council there for some time.

Whitby Township will be represented by a new man, Walter Weir, who replaces Charles L. Mackey.

At Beaverton Reeve John McRae has retired from the municipal field, after some years of service. He is replaced by a former reeve, James Birchard, who has been on the County Council before.

John Ross, Reeve of Thorah, better known as the Dean of the Council, is coming back, having been elected by acclamation.

The town of Uxbridge is also sending John Low back.

Having won their laurels as champions of a lower equalized assessment, it was only natural that the Township of Reach should send back to Whitby its reeve, Grant Christie, and its deputy-reeve, William Parrott. Both were congratulated on their work at the nomination meeting on Monday evening of last week.

From Mara John Bruce is coming back as reeve and Patrick Clarke as deputy-reeve.

Wilnot Bain is also coming back from the Township of Scott.

In the town of Whitby there is no change in County Council representation. Reeve Jackson and Deputy-reeve Rowe will serve again.

Allan Lavis has been endorsed by the ratepayers of East Whitby and is again reeve. His deputy of 1932, Everett Warne, was successful on Monday at the polls.

Up in Brock Reeve of the now famous committee on economy, was defeated by Mr. J. E. McDonald, deputy-reeve two years ago. The deputy, J. E. Ferguson, returns to the County Council.

One of the best known members of the Council, John Morris, of Rama, will be among the missing. He was defeated by Lawrence Cooper.

From Scugog Jonathan Aldred returns to Council. He was given an acclamation.

WHAT'S JUST AHEAD OF US
