Markham's Township's new
council met on Monday at Union-
ville, and took the oath of office be-
fore Clerk Davison. Reeve Padgett
was in the chair, and others pre-
sent were Deputy-reeve Robt. Smith,
Councillors Fred Cookwell, W. H.
Clark and George Hoover.

A large crowd was present, when
the question of relief was upper-
most. They were assured that no
child would go hungry, and that a
special meeting would be held shortly
to consider this vexious question.

A bylaw was passed extending the
time for the return of the collectors'
tokens to April 1st.

Ken Prentice interviewed the
council regarding the liability on
township road. Mr. Prentice is an

The secretary of S. S. No. 21
wrote asking for more money.

A bylaw was passed appointing
the Board of Health as follows:
